Go on, give it a go!







LINKED UNCRC ARTICLES

Many articles of the CRC relate to this week's theme but the activities link, in particular, to the following

Article 38 (war and armed conflicts)

15 to take part in war or join the armed forces.

Governments must do everything they can to protect and care for children affected by war and armed

Article 39 (recovery from trauma and reintegration)

Children who have experienced neglect, abuse, exploitation, torture or who are victims of war must receive special support to help them recover their health, dignity, self-respect and social life.








