



GENERAL STATEMENT

At St John Ogilvie Primary School, we recognise that pupils who have spent a busy, structured day at school need time to relax and unwind at the end of the afternoon and have an opportunity to play.

We are also mindful of the need to encourage children to pursue out-of-school activities e.g. swimming, football, Brownies, Beavers, etc.

We believe that homework activities should be set but should not promote resentment and arguments.

Homework should be used to effectively consolidate / extend what is learned in school.

Homework is planned to be meaningful. We hope that children will feel a sense of personal satisfaction in a task completed well and that their efforts will be recognised and praised both at home and at school. Homework should be undertaken to the best of their ability.

This approach aims to support children's growing perception about their ability to complete a task outside the school environment. It also fosters the skills of independent learning.

We hope that parents/carers will be willing and able to give their active support to ensure that work carried out at home is completed conscientiously and in the best possible conditions. Parents/carers are valuable partners in the education of our pupils.

1. INTRODUCTION

St John Ogilvie Primary School is firmly committed to promoting achievement and raising the attainment of all pupils. We recognise the significant contribution homework can make to the personal, social and academic success of the individual pupil. Homework has a very positive and significant effect on children's achievement and embeds positive learning habits for life—long learning.

Homework provides our pupils with the opportunity to practise and develop key skills already begun in school.

This policy was developed in response to a consultation with parents/carers, pupils and staff.

2. THE PURPOSE OF HOMEWORK

St John Ogilvie Primary regards the purpose of homework as:

- Sharing learning with parent/carers and providing opportunities for them to be involved in their child's learning.
- Consolidating and reinforcing skills and understanding, particularly in literacy and numeracy.
- Encouraging every child to grow in confidence and self-discipline required to study by themselves and grow towards becoming an independent learner.





3. AIMS OF THE POLICY

Through this policy, we aim to:

- Ensure consistency of approach throughout the school.
- Ensure progression towards independence and individual responsibility.
- Ensure the needs of individual pupils are taken into account.
- Ensure that children and parents/carers know what to expect.
- Extend and support the learning experience via reinforcement and revision.
- Provide opportunities for parents/carers, pupils and school to work in partnership.

4. ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

5. HOMEWORK TASKS

The nature of homework will depend on the age and stage of our pupils. Typical homework tasks are outlined below:

6. TERM TIME FAMILY HOMEWORK

It is not school policy to provide homework for pupils taking holidays during term time. However, parents/carers may wish to encourage their child to read for pleasure and keep a diary or another record of their holiday to share in class when they return.

Homework is not usually given out on the first or last week of a term or a shortened week due to bank holidays or In-Service days.

7. DIFFICULTIES WITH HOMEWORK

Homework is given out as a weekly assignment to help children to plan their homework and manage their time from an early age. This also allows flexibility if children have other activities on during the week, e.g. clubs.

We understand that home circumstances may make it difficult for homework to be completed at times. If this is the case then please contact the school via email or by using the Xpressions app. Our admin staff will pass your correspondence on to your child's class teacher.

Do not let your child become distressed about homework. If there is a problem, please contact Mrs McCulloch, Head Teacher as soon as possible to discuss this and avoid any further upset.
