#### **Head Teacher's Report**

As always at Braidhurst we have had a busy and productive term. Hopefully this newsletter will let you see the good work that goes on in Braidhurst High School.

It was therefore really disappointing to read the statistics in a newspaper with a 'table' of pupils achieving five Highers, where we do not look well. I would just like to point out that our dux last year achieved 6 A grade passes at Higher with the runner up achieving 5 grade A passes. This year we have two pupils applying for medicine and one applying for dentistry. The statistics in the table are based on the percentage of pupils in S4 who go on to achieve 5 Highers in S5 which is an extremely narrow measure.

It does not reflect the number of pupils who leave at the end of S4 or throughout their S5 to go to employment or college. 94.7% of our pupils have moved into a positive destination this year which is a significant improvement. University is not a route suitable for all of our pupils, and it is our duty to ensure we meet the needs of all our learners. We work hard to find the most appropriate pathway for your child whatever that may be. Nor does it count the number of pupils who do an alternative qualification in S5 other than a Higher grade course. For example, during study leave, we run an alternative curriculum for 40 of our S4 pupils who, not only have the opportunity to gain qualifications in first aid and food hygiene but also undertake a work placement to prepare them for their next steps.

As a school, we ensure that we provide many and varied opportunities to ensure our pupils move into a positive destination where they can contribute fully to society. Qualifications is one part of what a school should provide for the pupils in its care, and for our most academic pupils they can, and do, achieve.

I have an extremely hard working staff who willingly give up their time to support your child in various events. I have pupils whose behaviour is excellent and who are praised when they represent the school. I am extremely proud of every one in this school community and what we achieve together. Please do not judge us on one statistic. Our job is to get the message of everything our great school achieves to the community. Please help us by spreading the word!

S4/5/6 pupils don't forget to study and remember Easter school is there to support you! You are in a great place to move confidently towards your exams.




# **XL BAKE SALE**

# **VEX ROBOTICS - NATIONAL FINAL**

Congratulations to the school's robotic teams "KOALA-T" and "Anonymous" for reaching the quarter finals in the UK National Vex robotics competition in Telford. The Vex Robotics Challenge is the world's largest and fastest-growing robotics competition for high schools, colleges and universities. More than 10,000 teams from 32 countries took part in over 750 tournaments to compete to become the best in the world. Nearly 60 teams qualified for the UK finals, which took place at the Telford International Conference Centre. At the competition the North Lanarkshire teams took on the best of the UK, with the Braidhurst teams making it through to the quarter finals. In the VEX Competitions, presented by the Robotics Education & Competition Foundation, teams of students are tasked with designing and building a robot to play against other teams from around the world in a game-based engineering challenge. Classroom STEM concepts are put to the test on the playing field as students learn lifelong skills in teamwork, leadership, communications, and more. The Braidhurst robotics club has been very well supported by North Lanarkshire and includes pupils ranging from S1 to S4 including three S5 female students who act as STEM ambassadors and have committed to supporting the younger less experienced members. They are true role models and are equipping the developing young minds to meet the autonomous revolution that all countries are facing.





# PANTOMIME REWARD TRIP

Over 200 Braidhurst pupils were rewarded for their continued exemplary behaviour and effort at school with a reward trip, just before Christmas, to the 'Cinderella' pantomime at the SEC Armadillo in Glasgow on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> December. #### **S3 MENTAL HEALTH DAY**

Dear Parent/Carer,

#### **Meal Price Increase**

I am writing to inform you of price changes to the school meals service from 15<sup>th</sup> April 2019. The meal price will increase from:

Primary School Currently £2.00 will change to £2.10 for 2 courses and a drink. Secondary School Currently £2.05 will change to £2.15 for 2 courses and a drink.

For the last 2 years the school meal price has been held at £2.00 and £2.05 respectively. In comparing prices across other local authorities based on 2018/19 figures North Lanarkshire Council were 5<sup>th</sup> cheapest for the cost of a primary school 2 course lunch with drink and 6<sup>th</sup> cheapest for a secondary school 2 course lunch with drink. In increasing the school meal price we will still remain within the average price brackets.

All Primary 1 to 3 children are entitled to receive a free 2 course school meal with a drink which includes a choice from two main meals or a snack 2 go. Our menus can be accessed in various different ways via the council's website and you are able to set up an alert system to your mail box which provides in advance access to the weekly menu so you can assist with your child's selections. You can sign up to this when you access the Primary school meals page where the link is at the top of the page - northlanarkshire.gov.uk/primaryschoolmeals.

There are lots of exciting things going on within the school meals service and we have recently run competitions on increasing milk uptake 'Drink Milk Grow Healthy' and also on encouraging our children to try new foods from around the world the 'Be a Food Explorer'. We have increased vegetable content in some meals through blending such as the sauce for the pizza recipe and the tomato pasta dish. In addition our sweet treats often include fruit and vegetables.

We are preparing for forthcoming guidelines from the Scottish Government and will be reducing the number of times that ham will be available as a sandwich filling and introducing more reduced sugar sweet treats. We are also working with schools to reduce single use plastics and have various schools participating in pilots with us with the intention of rolling this out over the next 12 months.
