Numeracy & Mathematics

Numeracy Focus: Multiplication

<u>Mental Multiplication Strategies:</u> related facts e.g. 7x3=; $70 \times 3=$; 7x30=;70x30=;7x300 etc <u>Multiplication:</u> Learn and practise your table facts – look for tables that link together e.g. 2x/4xs/8xs; 3xs/6xs/12xs; 5xs/10xs; Learn 7xs, 9xs, 11xs.

<u>Activity:</u> Write out your table facts and memorise them; use dice and practise quick facts Extra challenge: Try multiplying with multiples of 10/100/1000 (see related facts)

*SELF-CORRECT any work you do using a calculator.

Mathematic Focus: Measure: Area

Look for square and rectangular areas in your home. Measure the length and the breadth using a measuring tape. Use the formula: Area = length x breadth to calculate the area. Remember to record your answers in centimetres squared. (cm 2)

Learning across the Curriculum Topic: Materials - Changes in State

Look around your home. Divide a page of your homework jotter into 2 and write at the top 2 headings: Reversible and Irreversible.

Look around your kitchen and home. Can you find 5 items to put in each list e.g. chocolate can be melted (changed into a liquid) but once cooled it changes back into a solid. So chocolate is a material where the change of state is reversable. However, sugar once dissolved in tea cannot change back into sugar, so this material is irreversible.

- 1. **Metalinguistics** the meaning of unfamiliar words
- 2. Summary a brief statement or account of the main points of something
- 3. Inference literal and inferential messages from texts to find out more about the setting, main events, characters, actions/feelings and plot
- 4. Visualisation Visualisation is creating pictures in your mind as you read using evidence from the text
- 5. Prior knowledge refers to what a learner already knows before learning new information
- 6. Main Ideas find the most important details from the text read between the lines to find authors themes
