Numeracy & Mathematics

Numeracy Focus: Division

<u>Mental Division Strategies</u>: Repeated Subtraction or Sharing e.g. 12 divided by 2 = 12 - 2-2-2-2 So, 12 divided by 2 is 6.

Division linked with multiplication: Know your table facts for quick division answers:

For example: 42 divided by 7: $7 \times ? = 42$, $7 \times 6 = 42$, so 42 divided by 7 = 6

<u>Activity:</u> Use or draw out a 100 square. Choose a number on the square and roll a dice. Divide the number on your square by the number on your dice. E.g. 36 divided by 6. Calculate the answer. Your answers may include remainders e.g. 83 divided by 9 = 9 r2.

Extra challenge: Challenge someone in your family to a game and use counters. Who can get 4 in a row?

Mathematic Focus: 3D OBJECTS

Around your home look out for 3D objects. Make a list of them and identify what 3D object they are e.g. Water bottle = Cylinder. Challenge yourself to find more unusual 3D objects such as: triangular prism, square based pyramid. Study each object and describe their properties e.g. How many faces/edges/vertices?

Literacy

Spelling: Your spelling words will be in your homework jotter and updated weekly. Choose an activity from the active spelling grid to practise your words. Extra challenge: Could you write a paragraph containing your words? Or ask a family member to dictate some sentences for you which contain your words? Reading: Continue to read books of your own choosing and complete your Reading Record in your weekly homework jotter. Can you join Kilsyth Library and visit it regularly with your family or friends?

Extra challenge: summarise, visualise or find the meaning of unfamiliar words in a dictionary/online (metalinguistics)

Writing: Recount Text: Find a news item in the media which captures your attention - look on CBBC Newsround for current ideas. Take notes about: Who/what/where/when/why. Recount (rewrite) the article in your own words. Include a picture, drawing or photograph.

Learning across the Curriculum Topic: Materials - Changes in State

Look around your home. Divide a page of your homework jotter into 2 and write at the top 2 headings: Soluble/Insoluble

With permission from an adult, look around your kitchen for powders and granules. Next, carry out a science investigation into which substances are soluble and insoluble - make sure it is a fair test. Record your results in your homework jotter e.g. drinking powder is soluble; grains of rice are insoluble.

Value of the Month: Believe in Yourself - Achieve your Goals.

Think about a challenge you could set yourself and have the confidence to complete it!

E.g. Conquer a Munro with your family; Run the couch to 5km challenge; Represent your school at something e.g. Sport/Art/Music Competition; Join a Club/Learn to play an instrument/bake a cake - anything you like really!!!

- 1. **Metalinguistics** the meaning of unfamiliar words
- 2. Summary a brief statement or account of the main points of something
- 3. Inference literal and inferential messages from texts to find out more about the setting, main events, characters, actions/feelings and plot
- 4. Visualisation Visualisation is creating pictures in your mind as you read using evidence from the text
- 5. Prior knowledge refers to what a learner already knows before learning new information
- 6. Main Ideas find the most important details from the text read between the lines to find authors themes
