



## Numeracy & Mathematics

**Numeracy Focus: Subtraction** 

<u>Dice Subtraction</u>: Roll a dice, then subtract the rolled number from a starting number, or roll two dice and subtract the smaller number from the larger one. Have your child write the sum on paper.

Mathematic Focus: Money

<u>Coin Rubbings</u> - Make coin rubbings by placing coins under paper and using a coloured pencil or crayon to produce the image on the paper. Then, your child can match coins to the rubbings. <u>Play Shop</u> - Use items from around the house to create a pretend shop. Create price tags for items. Role play the customer and shopkeeper to imitate buying and selling.

Mathematic Focus: Symmetry Have children paint a half butterfly wing on paper, then fold it to create a symmetrical design.

## Literacy

#### Spelling:

Your spelling words will be in your homework jotter and updated weekly. Choose an activity from the active spelling grid to practise your words.

#### Reading:

## Learning across the Curriculum

Topic: Toys

Ask children to make a list of toys they play with today. Children can then ask a grandparent or a parent about what they played with when they were younger and make another list. Children can draw pictures or ask an adult to help create each list. Discuss comparisons and differences.

#### Health and Wellbeing

Our value this month is generosity. We have been learning about what it means to be generous. We have been talking about how generosity is giving to others without expecting anything back. Children can go on a generosity scavenger hunt. How many ways can they spot someone being generous?

## P1-3 Spelling Strategies

\*Please note - the P1 children are only beginning to learn these strategies so wont yet be familiar with them all\*

The strategies the children are taught are:

- Using Phoneme Knowledge (sounding out)
- Syllabification breaking words down into syllables. The children can clap out words to identify syllables e.g. go-ing/An-drew
- Word Shape Look at letter shape, size, ascending and descending letters.
- Tricky Letters Looking at the position of tricky letters as an aid to spelling.
- Compound Words Breaking the compound word into simple words e.g. into makes in and to.
- Mnemonic using an aide memoire e.g.
   because Big Elephants Can Add Up Sums
   Easily
- Using Analogy If you know how to spell one word you can spell similar words e.g. if you can spell hill, you can spell mill, will, fill etc.

## P1-3 Word Attack Strategies

\*Please note - the P1 children are only beginning to learn these strategies so wont yet be familiar with them all\*



- Look at the first letter
- Sound out the first few letters
- Break the word into syllables
- Look at the last letters
- Read the sentence again
- Look at the picture
- Look at the shape of the word

## P1-3 Phoneme (sound) Methodology

\*Please note - the P1 children are only beginning to learn this process so will not yet be able to do this method independently

Individuals will explore a list of words with the phoneme. They will be encouraged to say the words, make/break it, read it out loud and write the word. Children use the diagram below to support this in class.
