Management review pending - process start Aug 2024 Moderation in broad general education project – involving smaller schools in NLC

S2 pupils attended Scottish Parliament, pupils behavior praised and good questions were posed to MSPs by the pupils Uniform policy being promoted—no leggings / joggers. Focus 2024/25 will be to encourage pupils to wear blazers

PISA study with occur later this month, study is an online assessment of maths, science & literacy, outputs from this study can used to produce international league tables

Positive destinations of pupils, it was reported that 2022/23 saw 24 pupils entering higher education, 2<sup>nd</sup> highest.

Acknowledgement that there is currently an increased pressure on 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> year pupils during assessment process, juggling projects, assignments, assessments.

Concerns regarding absences linked to events e.g. Sporting events. Acknowledgement that issues of attendance widespread and don't only relate to CHS

## 3. Bullying Policy / school handbook

Ms Darragh outlined the bullying behavior document, which has been developed. The school aims to provide a safe, secure & well-structured school,

## Highlighted points

- Behaviors within current S1 group is felt to be contributing
- Violence Prevention not being a by-stander
- Causes of bullying discusses with social media highlighted as the worst cause, often occurring out with core school hours
- Implement in partnership with pupils/ parents / careers working together to improve / prevent bullying
- PHSE structure enables teaching staff to be present in all areas
- Pupil peer support promote responsible behavior
- Community PC discusses with pupils what is acceptable / unacceptable behavior
- Support pupils with methods of conflict management

Bullying behavior document to be circulated to member of the parent council with any comments or suggestions being returned to AMCP / LP by 12<sup>th</sup> April 2024

- Commence behavior classes
- Promote MVP programme
- Numbers have been reduced in PHS classes
- Behaviors are now included in HMI inspections
- Behavior cards in use within the school
- Transition events are held to promote a smooth transition between primary and secondary, groups used at these events enables mixing of pupils and development of resilience
- Parental engagement is needed to assist with the bullying issue
- CHS behavior policy is covered within the school handbook, a copy of which is given to P7 pupils and new staff

Suggestions discussed / presented by the group included –

- Requirement for a social media policy for schools to be presented as a motion to Scottish Parliament
- Present behavior policy to parents at transition events and request support for these issues
- Define protective characteristics (Equality Act 2010) within bullying behavior document
- Consider asking pupils to signa behavior contract, this is currently practiced at DPS

4. LP updated the group on the feedback from last month's cluster meeting with potential for future opportunities being discussed. Cllr McCulloch commented that he felt it was a great event and encouraged future events.

Suggestions for future cluster events included –

- Collaboration with school shows across the cluster, pre-COVID this was supported by St Parick's Opera group
- Explore the possibilities in involving spotlight Shotts to provide a drama on behavioral issues with a focus on antibullying
- Research antibullying organisation / explore available resource
- Reach out to other cluster schools to take a lead on organizing next cluster event with the focus of the event being behavioral issues

	Discussion arose regarding MVP, CHS have MVP trained staff and MVP mentors trained (senior pupils). They work with pupil discussing and providing scenarios of what can be done as active bystander to prevent event occurring / prevent events occurring again. This hopefully empowers youngsters to cope with situations better.  There is an official play book with scenarios and outcomes which can be utilized.
