I know that we are looking at two year groups who are going to do themselves proud.

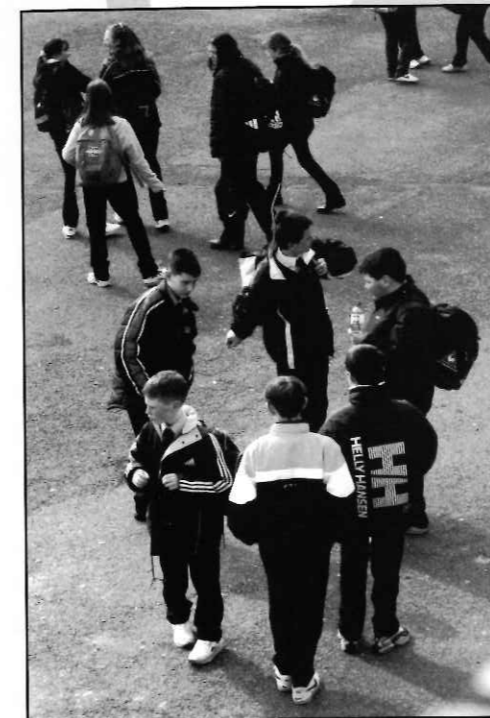

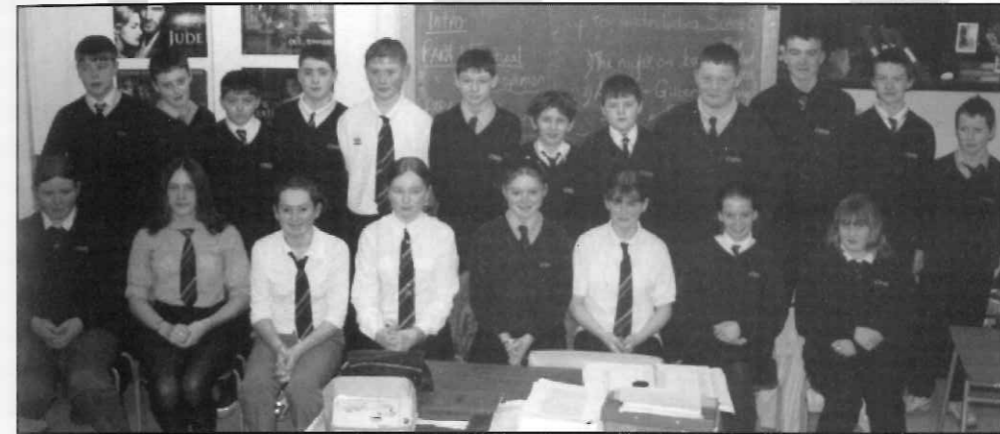

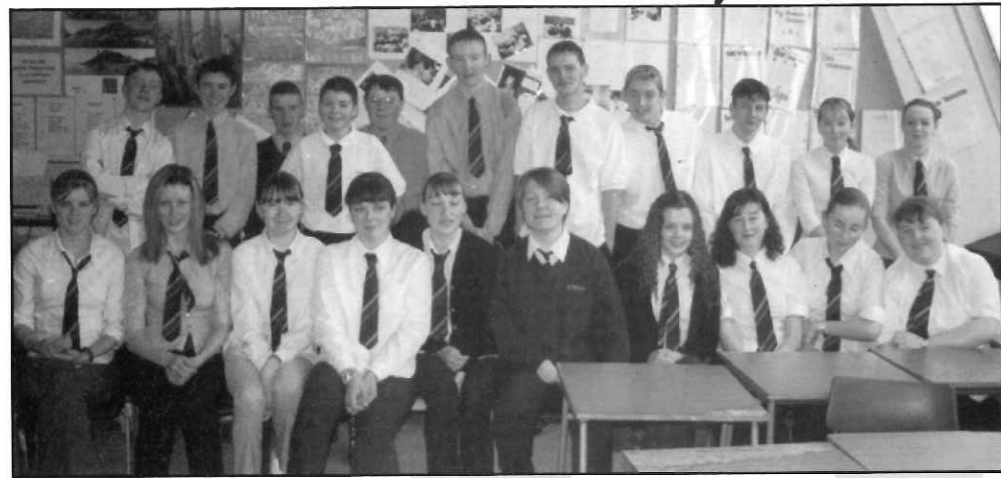

OUTWARD BOUND

Forty-Eight 4th and 5th year pupils participated in the week long Outward Bound programme at the Loch Eil centre near Fort William. They joined pupils from every Secondary School in North Lanarkshire in this Raising Achievement initiative .

The Outward Bound course is a programme of exciting and challenging activities, designed to develop a whole range of personal skills. The aim of the course is to help pupils realise their potential.



On arrival at the Loch Eil Centre pupils are split up into different clans, each clan containing a mix of pupils from different Schools . The activities on offer to the pupils include, rock climbing and abseiling on Ben Nevis. Also there is Hill-Walking, Orienteering and Kayaking. One of the most popular challenge is the Raft Building Competition. Each Clan designs, builds, and races their raft on Loch Eil.



There are other popular activities within the grounds of the centre, including a Parachute Jump, Zip Wire, Jacob's Ladder, Trapeze and the High Ropes challenge.

CNHS pupils thoroughly enjoyed their challenging week. They participated enthusiastically in all activities and voted the week an outstanding success.

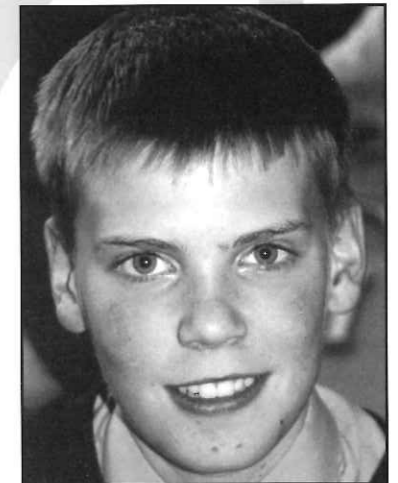
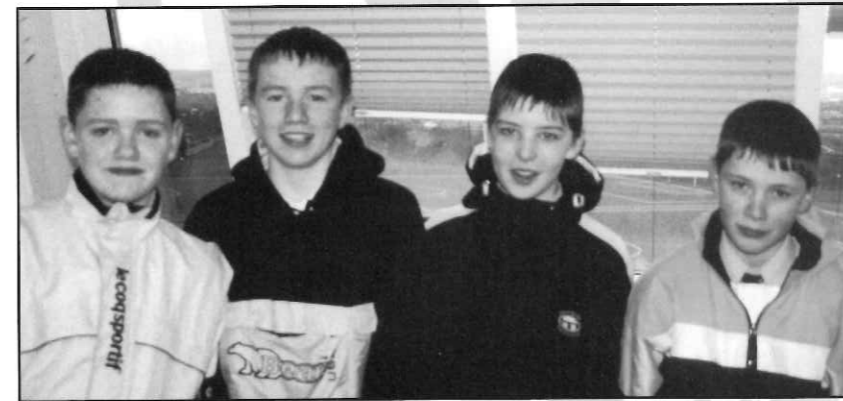


SECOND YEAR CHRISTMAS PARTY

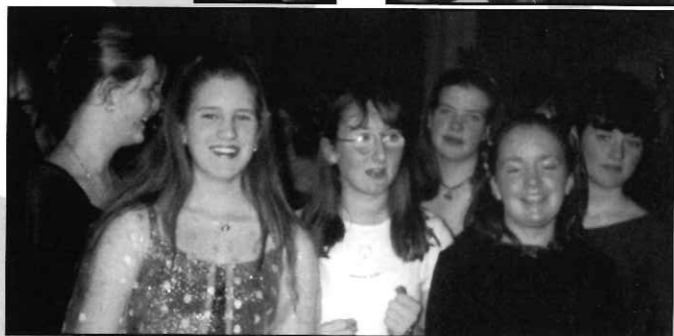


THIRD YEAR CHRISTMAS PARTY

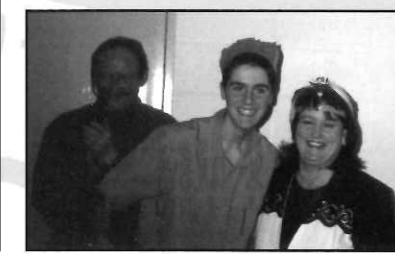

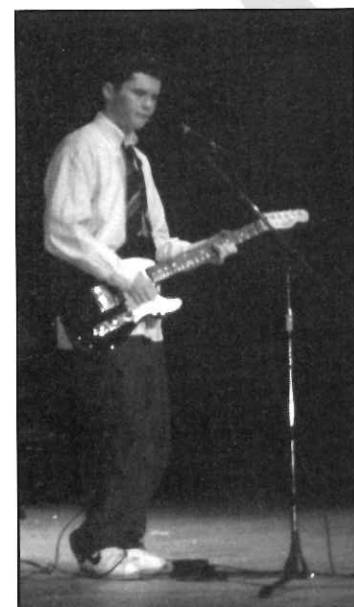
FOURTH YEAR CHRISTMAS PARTY
