

We've travelled together; trips to London and Spain. Being in different environments allowed us to view different sides of our peers. We were stunned by weird things:






















hospitalised in a forgien country(melodramatic?, Lianna?)

Once the lights came up and the music died, everyone headed home for a good night's sleep, to ensure fresh faces and eager brains the next day at school. *Uh-huh!*





















John Charles Hutchison represented Lanarkshire and Scotland at U 15s, while Darren Miller and John Hopkins featured in the Lanarkshire 18s.


The U 12s won the North Lanarkshire league and are now competing in the Lanarkshire super league, having already qualified for the semifinal of the Lanarkswhire cup.








London 2001

This was one of the best groups to date. The pupils were a credit to themselves, the staff and the school. Next years pupils have a lot to live up to. No problemo!










































A Final Word


