Within the nursery we have been discussing with the children their favourite stories and asking them if they have been having a bedtime story. This has shown that some children within the nursery have a bedtime story most days. Research tells us that a bedtime story has long been known to foster parent-child bonds and prepare children for sleep. But lately researchers have attached other powers to this night-time routine. They say "while you and your little one are sailing with Max to the land of the Wild Things or sampling green eggs with Sam, you're actually boosting your child's brain development. These gains range from improved logic skills to lower stress levels. But perhaps the most profound benefit discovered in recent years is the way bedtime stories can rewire children's brains to quicken their mastery of language".

600hrs Early Learning & Childcare for 2 year olds

From August 2015 the criteria for free places changed to benefit more families. You or a family member's child could be entitled to almost 600 hours per year free early learning and childcare under the new criteria. Your 2 year old may be eligible if one of the following apply. You are in receipt of one of these benefits:

- Income Support
- Income based job seekers allowance
- Any income related element of the Employment and Support Allowance
- Child Tax Credit but not Working Tax Credit and your income is less than £16,010 per year
- Maximum Child Tax Credit and maximum Working Tax Credit and your income is less than £6,240
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Or they are:
- Looked after
- Under a kinship care order
- Live with a Parent Appointed Guardian
