What is CfE?

- We live in a fast changing world with lots of new technology.
- We need to prepare our children for the changes that have happened and will happen.
- Key skills for life investigate, analyse, problem solve and work co-operatively.



The Principles Behind Curriculum for Excellence

- Raise standards.
- Improve knowledge.
- Develop skills.
- Make learning real by focusing on the learner.
- Help children to make connections in all the different areas of learning.

How will we do this?

- Build on the best practice in our school.
- Use up to date technology.
- Develop children's knowledge and skills through interdisciplinary learning e.g. use a topic to teach lots of different areas.
- Develop our partnerships with our link nurseries and Cardinal Newman to build on previous learning and plan better for the future.

Key Points

- Central to all learning will be literacy, numeracy and health and well being.
- All staff will be responsible for delivering these subject areas.
- There will be continuous assessment through each child's education to support their learning.
- The curriculum is about the whole child, recognising achievements in and out of school.



Numeracy

- Initially your child will work on developing confidence within numbers to 10.
- This will take the form of.....
- Counting forwards and backwards
- Identifying the number before and after a given number

Numeracy

- Predicting the next number in a sequence.
- Saying the number before or after a given number.
- Working on their ability to recognise numerals to 10 and form these correctly.
- Data handling at this stage takes the form of sorting and grouping.

Numeracy

- They will learn about the properties of 2D and 3D shape.
- Time will be taught initially through seasons and then focusing on recognition of the hour and half hour.
- This work will happen using the SEAL approach to teaching maths.

What Is SEAL?

- Stages of Early Arithmetical Learning
- Stage 0
- Emergent Counter –
- Cannot count visible items
- The child may not know the number words.
- The child cannot coordinate number words with items.



- Stages of Early Arithmetical Learning
- Stage 1
- Perceptual Counter -
- Can count perceived items
- May involve seeing, hearing or feeling items.



- Stages of Early Arithmetical Learning
- Stage 2
- Figurative Counter —
- Can count the total of two collections.
- Counts from one

What Is SEAL?

- Stages of Early Arithmetical Learning
- Stage 3 Our goal for confident learners usually beyond P1
- Initial Number Sequence
- Child uses <u>and understands</u> counting-on rather than counting-from-one.

What Is SEAL?

- Stages of Early Arithmetical Learning
- Stage 3 Our goal for confident learners usually beyond P1
- Uses counting on to solve addition and missing add end tasks.
- May use count-down-from strategies

How Do We Do This?

- Your child will learn in a different way than you may have done yourselves.
- They will engage in different activities relating to the concept being taught. Eg. recognition of number or subitising through what we would call domino cards.

Number Talks

- This has been a school improvement plan priority.
- It is a North Lanarkshire Council endorsed approach to developing confidence in mental maths calculation based on the teaching of strategies.
- In P1 the focus is Counting All / Counting On.

Literacy: Learning To Read

- Our pupils are taught phonics and spelling using the North Lanarkshire Active Literacy programme.
- This is a progressive programme that begins with children learning their initial 26 sounds, and moves on to teaching them about phonemes.
- A phoneme is a unit of sound within a word e.g. 'sh' and 'ch'



Phonemes

- The children learn new phonemes with the help of characters called Ben, Belle and Dasher. These 3 characters help the children to understand the phonemes in a context.
- Phonics is taught with one main focussed lesson in the week, followed by short daily activities to reinforce the learning.

How does this happen?

- The Teacher introduces each sound in a context i.e. a story/song and then demonstrates the letter formation and word building through the use of a magnetic board and letters.
- The children are provided with a magnetic board to allow them to mirror the taught lesson and work independently/with a partner throughout the week.

Blending

- Children are asked to say the word out loud, make the word using their magnetic letters, break the word into sounds e.g. shark sha r k, then blend the word from left to right e.g. sh —sha—shar —shark.
- Finally they read the word they have made.



Spelling / Common Words

- Spelling is taught with one main focussed lesson in the week, followed by short daily activities to reinforce the learning.
- The words from the taught lesson are known as common words.
- These are the words which the children are most likely to come across when reading simple texts. They will also use these words in writing.



Talking & Listening

- This is a main focus across the curriculum. Pupils are introduced to a wide range of stories and non-fiction texts and encouraged to respond to them in a variety of ways.
- Pupils are given opportunities to talk about the own experiences and feelings in the class setting.

Strategies

- The strategies the children are taught are:
- Using Phoneme Knowledge (sounding out)
- Syllabification –breaking words down into syllables.
- The children can clap out words to identify syllables e.g. go-ing
