



What is our rationale for implementing a play based approach?


Research has shown that play allows children to use their creativity while developing their imagination, dexterity, physical, cognitive and emotional strength.




What does a day look like in P1 in Noble Primary School?

How can I support Early Literacy development at home?



ENJOYMENT MOTIVATION

SELF- ESTEEM

1. Talking and Listening

- Sing nursery rhymes, talk about words that rhyme make up rhyming strings eg cat, hat, mat...
- Clap out syllables in words and listen for patterns
- Listening for and distinguishing between sounds









2. Phonics

- Each letter has a name, a sound and a formation
- Listen for the sounds all around you
- Play 'I spy...'
- Go on sound hunts in the house
- Practise the formation using salt or sugar in a tub



3. Reading

- Enjoy stories together. Have a favourite. Retell in own words
- Play matching games, pairs games with common words
- Talk the words in sentences


4. Writing

- Develop fine motor skills using toys, lego, pegs, play dough
- Climbing frames and monkey bars to build core strength
- Carry heavy things (shopping bags, boxes)
- Build gross motor skills ball throwing, swimming, sports
- Draw pictures together. Add details and talk about them.
- **VALUE** every mark they make and every story it tells. It has meaning to them!
