# January Right of the Month: Article 30



MUNCRC Article 30

Article 30 of the UNCRC makes it clear that children and young people who belong to a minority group have the right to share their culture, language and religion with other people in that group.

I have a right to speak my own language and to follow my family's way of life

#### Minority groups include:

- Ethnic minorities
- Religious minorities
- Linguistic minorities— people who use a language that's not the one most people use. That includes signed languages as well as spoken ones: British
   Sign Language users are members of a linguistic minority.

While most of what Article 30 says is implied by other Articles of the UNCRC, it exists to make clear that the rights of minority children and young people should not be overlooked by people who think about how to put the Convention into practice. It applies to everyone in Scotland and not just its citizens— so refugees in the process of seeking asylum are covered by it in the same way as everyone else.



## The Virtual Classroom

All schools in North Lanarkshire have access to the Virtual Classroom that can be accessed through Glow (a link is in your child's class Microsoft Team).

#### Accessing the NL Virtual Classrooms

Your child will access the Virtual Classrooms through the Glow Launchpad (https://www.rmunify.com/) using their Glow Login.

It is recommended not to use Internet Explorer browser, you may need to change if this your default browser.



After logging in, on the left hand toolbar, click on the North Lanarkshire Council Launch Pad.



Click on the NL Virtual Classrooms App.





#### NL Virtual Classrooms Glow Layout

The NL Virtual Classroom contains coloured tiles linked to Interactive Classrooms. Your child will be directed to an appropriate colour classroom by their school. Click on the classroom to access the Weekly Interactive Classroom.



#### Interactive Classroom

Each Weekly Interactive Classroom provides learning and activities for Literacy, Numeracy, STEM and Health and Wellbeing. These are accessed by clicking on the icons shown within the Interactive Classroom. You may need to select open browser for all links to work.

#### **Sharing Completed Work**

Your child can upload completed work to their Class Team for feedback. Their school may give specific instructions for uploading completed work.

# Health and Safety: Jewellery, Earrings and False Nails

#### Make a Difference

The media is filled with stories of all kinds of problems in the world that the human race has caused. As a result we are often prompted, in big and small ways, to make a difference to others, our community and our world. This deliberate attempt to do a good deed, without expecting anything in return, has a very positive impact on our self-esteem.

Through this unit, the children will learn that they can begin to solve some of the problems in the world. By starting with a small idea or with something they care deeply about, children can contribute to making a difference. We know that when we connect to something bigger than ourselves, we feel fulfilled and have a greater sense of purpose.

#### Talk It Over:


Talk about a time you have helped to make a difference to someone or something – it might be campaigning, volunteering or helping someone in school or in your community. Talk about how it made you feel to do this.


#### **Home Activity:**


We would like our families to think of something or someone in their community who needs a little help. What could you do to make a difference?
