Would be good if there was a lunch monitor to encourage my daughter to eat more at lunch. There are 10 members of staff supervising every lunch break, who offer plenty of encouragement and support.

Buddies should be there to help P1's with how to get meals and make sure they eat. Also they should help them change their indoor shoes. As a parent of a P1 new start and a parent of a buddy, I feel the Buddy System has failed this year in comparison to my other child's first week. Our P1's are learning how to become independent learners when they start school, so although buddy support is initially extensive, it is gradually reduced to encourage this independence. Our buddies also need to get to know their own class and their new teachers, so this gradual reduction in buddy time benefits all learners. Buddies are still present in the playground and at wet intervals, so a familiar face is never far away. P1's will spend regular educational sessions with their buddy when the "Reading Buddy" system is launched later in the term.
