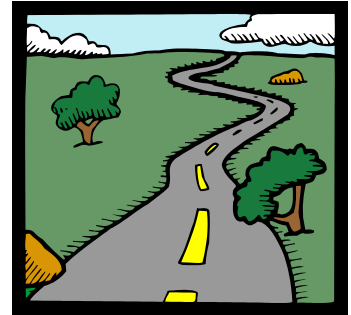

Continuing the Learner Journey

In St Ambrose High School, all learners are offered a broad general education during the Junior Phase of Curriculum for Excellence which allows them to build on previous learning and to develop a range of transferable skills essential for success in the 21st Century. As our young people prepare to continue that learning journey from S2 into S3, they will have the opportunity to further specialise in their choice of subjects to pursue their interests, deepen their learning and build towards National Qualifications in the Senior Phase.



When and how will these decisions be made?

A detailed S2 Subject Decisions programme is in place in order to support our young people in making decisions which are most suited to them.

- ❖ This booklet provides details about the curriculum available as well as information on certification in the Senior Phase
- ❖ During Personal Support, all pupils have been participating in lessons about Careers and making subject decisions which best suit them. Pupils also visit the Careers library and work with the Librarian and Careers Advisers
- ❖ Pupils will have had a one-to one interview with a Careers Adviser to encourage informed and relevant decisions
- ❖ A shorter Subject Decision pamphlet has been at an assembly to each pupil as a ready reckoner to support them in their decisions
- ❖ Subject departments will continue to detail the curriculum on offer and the progression available within the subject
- ❖ All S2 pupils will meet with student mentors from Glasgow Caledonian University on Friday 24th January and will spend a morning learning about programmes on offer at GCU, skills and qualifications required, and will participate in workshops with the students from a range of courses such as Psychology, Journalism, Law, Internet Security, Radiography and many more
- ❖ There will be a **Parents' Consultation Meeting with class teachers on 5th March** to discuss progress in Curriculum for Excellence so far and there will be an opportunity for parents/carers to meet with the DHT to learn more about the curriculum on offer. Prior to this, there is a **Curriculum Information evening on Thursday 23rd January** where staff, local industry, Glasgow Caledonian University students and former students to name only a few, will be available to talk to pupils and parents about the subjects and links to courses and industry
- ❖ Each pupil will have a one-to-one interview with their Pupil Support Teacher where they will discuss the reasons for their decisions and the appropriateness of them with regard to the pupil's abilities, strengths and interests
- ❖ Pupils will then bring home their Subject Decision form to discuss with parent/carer
- ❖ The form should then be returned to their Pupil Support teacher who interviewed them with the decisions finalised and signed by the parent/carer.



This programme will help all of our young people to make the right decisions about the subjects which interest and inspire them to reach their full potential and to develop skills for learning, skill for life and skills for work.

What about Certification in the Senior Phase?

As Curriculum for Excellence has been rolled out, the nature of the courses which students will undertake in the Senior Phase has changed quite significantly. By S4, many pupils will progress to National Qualifications as appropriate to their needs, following the range of courses which allow them to specialise, while still providing a sufficiently broad range within their curriculum. In addition, a range of alternative certificated courses are available in a number of other areas.

- ❖ Courses at National 2, 3 and 4 will be assessed as Pass/Fail
- ❖ National 5 and Higher courses will be graded A to D
- ❖ Only National 5 qualifications and above will have external examinations
- ❖ Details of the National 4 and National 5 courses are given in Appendix 2

What about progression through the Senior Phase?

It is important to consider the different routes of progression which learners can have on their learning journey. It should be noted that some courses are not offered at all levels and this may impact on decisions made by young people as they seek to ensure the most suitable pathways beyond school and for any career choices in the future.

All of the above courses will be offered at National 4 and National 5, with the exception of those courses marked as (*) which are part of the alternative certification courses. In addition, Accounting is not offered at National 4 level.

Most of the above can also progress to Higher level. Appendix 1 identifies the Stages of Progression available for each of the courses offered in the Senior Phase. We will, of course, continue to review and develop choice for students as they move into the Senior Phase.

Supporting Transition from the Junior Phase Broad General Education into the Senior Phase

Our young people have now been following the Broad General Education (BGE) which is the framework of Benchmarks (Experiences and Outcomes) which shape the teaching and learning of our pupils from S1-3. As S3 ends, pupils begin to work towards the aims of the National Qualifications which chime with the skills they have been developing in the BGE. Pupils will not be identified at this stage as a National 4 or 5 candidate. Instead, in S3, pupils work towards achieving levels 3 and potentially level 4 of the BGE, which will allow them to continue these transferable skills in their subject choices into S3. As our young people have been well supported through the range of professionals working with them which has offered insight and information regarding their interests, this should facilitate a smoother transition for them as they move from S2 to S3 and beyond into the Senior Phase.

What subjects can be studied?

A varied curriculum path is encouraged, with pupils building on their learning in the different curricular areas as they progress through the Broad General Education. However, in order to increase personalisation and choice, pupils are given a greater scope in terms of the subjects which they can choose to further study in S3.

Pupils will study NINE subjects (plus PE and RE). This is broken down as follows -

- ❖ Maths
- ❖ English
- ❖ Languages for Life and Work (S3 only)
- ❖ Remaining SIX subjects will be made up by
 - Choosing at least ONE Science (can be more than one)
 - Choosing at least ONE Social Science (can be more than one)
 - Choosing at least ONE Expressive Art (can be more than one)
 - Choosing at least ONE Technology (can be more than one)
 - Remaining TWO choices to be made from across the curricular areas dependent on personal choice

At the end of S3, pupils will move to 7 subjects to further specialise in their studies.

What about Vocational Qualifications?

Vocational Qualifications will be available in the Senior Phase for those pupils who are interested in this route. During the S2 Subject Decision interview, pupils will be asked to indicate whether they may be interested in this when they reach S5.

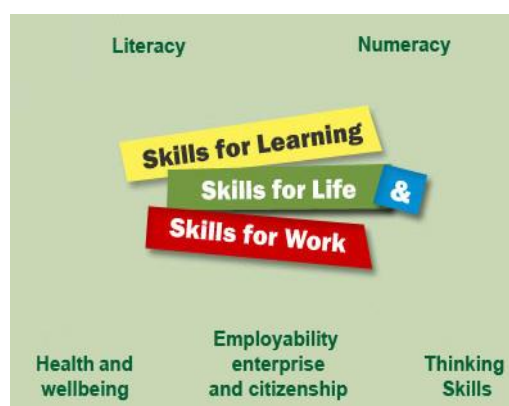


This will only be an indication at this stage and it should be noted that the subjects on offer can vary from year to year.

How will skills continue to be developed?

Curriculum for Excellence provides young people with the knowledge, skills and attributes they need to thrive in a modern society and economy.

In the Junior Phase, pupils have already developed a range of subject specific skills through the Experiences and Outcomes in each of their courses. They have also been developing transferable generic skills which will help them to cope with the challenges which they will face in the future – skills for learning, skills for life and skills for work. Indeed, these skills are considered so important that literacy, numeracy and health and wellbeing skills remain the responsibility of all within the school.



As pupils move through the final year of their Broad General Education and on into the Senior Phase, they will continue to develop this broad range of transferable skills. With skills development being at the very heart of progression, the move from the Junior to the Senior Phase will continue to focus directly on the skills being developed, integrated and embedded into all programmes, activities and assessments. In addition to skills for learning, life and work, all National Qualifications will have the Core Skills of Communication, Numeracy, Problem Solving, Information Technology and Working with Others embedded into their courses and assessments. These Core Skills are detailed below:

Core skill	Examples
Communication	Taking part in discussions, writing letters and reports, understanding written information
Numeracy	Using tables, diagrams, graphs and symbols, and working with money and measurements
Problem solving	Analysing a situation, planning a strategy, obtaining resources, using information and evaluating procedures
Using information technology	Using the internet and e-mail, preparing documents and presentations
Working with Others	Planning and carrying out a task in cooperation with other group members

Developing Scotland's Young Workforce

Our government has made clear that education which is relevant and fully equips young people for the potentially varied and unpredictable workplace is a significant element of the work to be undertaken by schools. The aim is to develop a prosperous and fair country in which all citizens help to shape with a society in which everyone can play their full part and share the benefits of success. A critical element of achieving this is in equipping our young people for employment.

This has required a fundamental examination of the pathways we provide for young people and how we promote and value a range of learning which leads to a wide variety of jobs. It also means ensuring that all young people, whatever the barriers they face, have fair access to these opportunities.

Fundamentally, this is about ensuring a work relevant educational experience for our young people. It is about all of us valuing and understanding what a rich blend of learning, including vocational education, can offer. It is about employers playing an active role, both shaping and benefiting from Scotland's education system by helping to create the talent pool they need and recruiting young employees. Ultimately, it is about the future workforce, our young people, making informed and ambitious choices about jobs and careers, ready to take their place in the world as effective contributors.

In St Ambrose, we are well on our way to achieving many of these outcomes and already partnerships with many companies and stakeholders have begun to emerge, with the intention of this leading to employment and training for a number of our young people. For our current S2, this will mean real experiences in the workplace and real training which will blend with their course work in the Senior Phase. This will facilitate more confident and capable young people to leave school with better career prospects and a realistic understanding of what is required in the world of work.

To this end, we already have a number of businesses working in partnership with our school as detailed below:

Linsini Group; MD Builders, QA Apprenticeships; BOSCH (LAGTA); Street League are our developing business partnerships from 2020 onward, with solid links already having been forged with JP Morgan; Police Scotland; Sky; NHS and Robertsons' Homes. Support ranges from visits on site to talks from representatives of these companies, to work placements and work experience.

All of the subject decisions S2 pupils make now will be the start of the pathways which may lead to these opportunities in S4 and beyond.

However, the attainment of National Qualifications is essential for our pupils to help them be fully equipped for the future, and detailed below are the courses and the levels at which they are presented. Currently, as we go to print in this document, the nature of assessment for these courses is changing as emphasis is placed more on the external exams for National 5 and there is no necessity to pass internal units as has been the case until recently. National 4 courses remain the same with no external exam and unit forming the assessment elements of the courses.
