

How will languages be taught?

Learning a new language in the early years should be enjoyable. Children will be introduced to French with a gentle approach, little and often. This will consist of games, songs, rhymes and stories as well as day to day instructions and conversational phrases.

The emphasis will be on listening and talking and having as much fun with the language as possible. There will also be opportunities to learn about the cultures and customs of others.

How can I support my child in learning a modern language?

- Show a positive and healthy attitude towards learning about new languages and cultures.
- Look for foreign words together in everyday life.
- Learn together - ask your child to teach you what he/she has learned in school.

What is changing in our schools?

The 1+2 Approach is a Scottish Government initiative which states that all children from Primary 1 (or earlier) are entitled to learn a modern language until the end of the Broad General Education (S3).

Angus, Dundee and Perth & Kinross Councils are working together to make this happen.

Why 1+2?

The mother tongue (English for most) is referred to as L1. The L2 refers to the first modern language that pupils will learn at school. French is initially the L2 for Pan Tayside pupils. A second modern language, L3, will begin by P5.

L1 - The mother tongue

L2 - French

L3 - Second new language

Why should my child learn a modern language?

As well as the numerous benefits of learning a modern language there are many reasons why children should start young:

- *Young children have a natural curiosity for sounds and words and a strong desire to communicate.*
- *They are receptive to learning another language.*
- *They have high motivation and enthusiasm for learning.*
- *Young children can copy sounds exactly as they are said and have less fear of worrying what others will think.*
- *It helps to develop a healthy brain.*

Myths about language learning!

Everybody speaks English.

Reality: Only 6 % of the world's population speak English as a first language. 75 % of the world's population don't speak any English. English is NOT enough!

Learning languages is particularly difficult.

Reality: Appropriate teaching methods can ensure success in modern language learning for all learners. Effective language learning and teaching will encourage children and young people to use their literacy and language learning skills more effectively.

You have to be fluent for languages to be of any use.

Reality: A little language goes a long way!

If you can't speak English properly you can't learn another language.

Reality: Languages are interconnected; your child will be encouraged to see the links between languages and to recognise how languages work. It gives learners a deeper understanding of how their own language works and develops their confidence and literacy skills.
