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Rector's Message

Over the session the long awaited upgrading and extension to parts of the school have been completed, and will be ready for full use on our return from the summer holidays in August.

The work has resulted in the complete renovation of the ground floor of the 'new' building. This has provided first class accommodation for the Support for Learning and Guidance departments. A new social area for pupils with a catering outlet and new toilet facilities has been in use since the start of this term.

The new building provides new office accommodation, a staffroom, two technical rooms, two general classrooms and a wood preparation room. Parents and visitors will notice a new main entrance which will be used for the first time at this year's prizegiving.

The vacated offices will be converted to music practice rooms. The RME department will be brought in to the main building from the huts and there will some other minor alterations to the rooming of some teachers. Added to the previous new bus bay and upgraded kitchens this has been a tremendous boost to the school.

Morrison's Construction were fulsome in their praise of the conduct of our pupils reporting that they had a incident free period of work at Blairgowrie High School. Our pupils also excelled over the session in representing the school in the range of sporting and cultural events, trips and visits that we provide over the year. Most recently at our two Activities Days. Well done to them. To the staff who have gone out of their way by providing the effort in their own time to provide these opportunities — a huge thank you. This is at the heart of Curriculum for Excellence and allows our pupils to develop both personally and socially.

This session we have lost five teachers. Mr. Walker, Principal Teacher (PT) of the Support for Learning (SfL) department was recently appointed to Perth and Kinross Council as a councillor for the Carse of Gowrie ward. Ms. Irvine left us for an extended career break at the start of session, and recently tendered her resignation from the English department, having found permanent employment in England. We had two teachers transferred from the school - from the Modern Languages department Madame Moullier went to Perth High School and more recently Mrs. Watt of the Chemistry department went to Perth Grammar. Our thanks and best wishes go with them in their new careers.

We had one retirement this session – Mr. Howie of the History department. We wish him well for a long and happy retirement and thank Mr. Howie for many years of service.

During the session we welcomed Mrs. Pirie who was appointed internally to the post of PT SfL, Ms. Sinclair and Mrs. Elliot to the Geography department and Mr. Fernandez as PT of Business Studies.

Our two probationers have successfully completed their year and we wish them well for the future – Mr. McCleary (English) and Ms. Tragham (Art). We hope to welcome two probationer teachers in August, in Mathematics and in English. Presently three full-time replacements are being sought for the Home Economics, Art and Support for Learning departments.

Applying to University?

Filling in the UCAS application is time-consuming and challenging but it is extremely important to sell yourself well to ensure that you are accepted to the courses and universities that you want as the demand for places is high. From my personal experience there are a few important things to consider.

Firstly, make sure you do thorough research by getting prospectuses for all the universities you are interested in and take time to look through the courses as there are many that you may not have thought of. Compare courses at different universities as they may be quite different even if they sound the same. Go to lots of open days and be prepared with lots of questions to ask the lecturers and students. There are vast differences between the facilities and how well the universities sell themselves to prospective students. Be open to different ideas; I have applied to a course I had never thought of after seeing a very eye-catching stand with enthusiastic staff and pupils at an open day. Try to organise work experience in your chosen field as it can totally change your mind about your career choices.

The personal statement is one of the most important parts of your application. You should make it interesting, unique and relevant to your subject and start it early to ensure you write it really well to give universities a good impression of you. Show knowledge and enthusiasm for your subject, emphasise your strengths and include hobbies, interests and jobs to illustrate your qualities and skills. Keep in mind the strict criteria about the length of your statement as getting everything you want in whilst keeping to the limits proved difficult for me! Make sure you are aware of the school and UCAS deadlines and keep in contact with your guidance teacher to make sure you're doing everything you should be and that they have all the information they need to complete your reference.

Finally, don't leave everything until the last minute as getting yourself and your guidance teacher stressed out isn't going to make your application any better.

Geography and Biology Field Trip to Glen Clova

The Geography department ran their annual field work trip to Glen Clova at the beginning of May. The aim of the trip was to study and reinforce work on physical geography, enquiry skills and land use management. This year the Biology department joined forces with Geography to do some cross-curricular work, helping the pupils to see the links between the two subjects.

More than 70 pupils braved the winds and rain - at least there were no midges this year! All had a great time and, as usual, lots of pupils made the mistake of wading in water higher than their wellies!

This is how one group described the day:



"Before we got to Glen Clova, we stopped at Cullow market and gathered information about **U shaped valleys** and **corries.** We also stopped further up at Glenarm to look at an **esker**.

"We finally arrived at Glen Doll's rangers centre and our class headed to the icy cold river. We measured the speed of the river by timing how long a piece of apple took to travel between two points.

"We then went to the ranger's centre to find out what the ranger service is about and how they protect wildlife in the area.

"Later we walked in the forest behind the river in the rain. We had our lunch under the forest (to try to keep dry!) before we did more experiments. We walked a bit further and found good spots to test the pH of the soil - one in the open and one under the trees. "When all the groups were back on the bus we set off along the very twisty road. One unpleasant thing did happen - Jordan vomitted all over himself and the seat. Angus who had been sitting next to him, moved near us and explained to everyone every detail - thanks!

Emma; A U shaped valley is a huge deep valley with steep sides. It used to be a V shaped valley formed by rivers before the ice eroded it deeper and deeper.





What does a good piece of writing look like in Modern Languages?



New Lunchtime Club

CAT Tests

Cognitive Abilities Tests or 'CATs' are used to assess pupils' learning to date. Alongside reports from primary, the information provided allows us to establish benchmarks against which future progress can be measured. Pupils will sit three tests during the day covering verbal (words), quantative (number) and non-verbal (shape and space). Pupils are not expected to revise for these

Common Assessments

At various times in the year pupils in S1 to S4 have a week of tests across all of their subjects. This allows us to track pupils' progress. To reduce pressure, you can help your child to plan revision in advance of these common assessment weeks.
