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Rector's Message

How quickly this term has flown past, already this is the first issue of the parents' newsletter for session 2012-13. I hope you find the articles interesting and informative. Our thanks are due to Mr Darby, Ms Stewart and Miss Milne who collate and edit your newsletter.

A special welcome to the parents of our S1. You should have recently received your child's 'settling in' report. Parent surveys show that any information additional to the formal reports during the year is very much valued. I hope you found these reports useful.

The school has shown a very positive trend in SQA exam results in recent years. In 2012 we have again showed advances in most areas that are recorded. A full summary of the results were contained in a recent issue of the Blairgowrie Advertiser and a copy of this is on our website. S4 reached record levels of achievement this year. In S4 93% of pupils gained at least 5 Standard Grades, and for 33% of pupils these were at Credit level. This maintained the increases in attainment that we have seen in past few years.

The S5 results show that 47% of the S4 group of pupils in 2011, went on to achieve at least 1 Higher in S5, and 23% achieved 3 or more Highers in 2012. These are the best results ever at these levels, beating last year's record figures.

In S6, 51% of pupils from that cohort of pupils from S4, went on to achieve at least 1 Higher. For the first time we can say that more than half of all pupils in Blairgowrie High School go on to achieve at Higher level.

These figures are pre-appeal and we expect all the attainment figures to rise slightly once the appeals process has been completed. These results are the reward for the hard work that our students put in throughout the year, supported by our parents, and taught by our staff. We aim to bring out the very best in these, our pupils and your children. I would ask that you continue to set the very highest of standards for your children, as we do in Blairgowrie High School, so that they may gain the most from their school career.

At this time last year I reported the building work that had started in August 2011. We are grateful to Morrison's Construction who have completed the work on time and allowed the school to take full advantage of the new facilities offered by this investment.

The successful Parent Council AGM on 19 September allowed those parents present to view the new building for themselves.

As ever, should you find that you have a query during the session, then please contact your child's guidance teacher at your earliest convenience either with information that would be helpful to us about your child, or with your concern so that we can respond.

Schools are busy places and all teachers have timetabled classes. It is therefore always best to phone and either leave a message, or make an appointment. We cannot guarantee that you will able to see the guidance teacher you require without doing so.

Please note that pupils have been issued with a study planner. This has a space where you as parent should sign every week. This should help you become part of the routine of homework. In consultation with our seniors, these are not issued to S5 or S6.

Between us we can make this another, even more successful year for our school and our students.

Jampionships

The "World Jampionship" is a competition based in Blairgowrie with the aim of promoting local produce and finding the world's best jam. Over the summer the school played host to the first Jampionships Cooking challenge. Three hundred pupils took up the challenge and 40 finalists entered the cook off on Friday 17th August. The students had one hour to prepare and present their dishes.

The categories were baked, savoury and desserts, for both junior and senior students. All the finalists' dishes were presented in the school's training restaurant, "Aspirations". Mackays, the world renowned Scottish Jam makers, sent along their Marketing Coordinator, Claire Smith as a judge and supplied the winners with goody bags; Elaine Cox, representing Scotland Food and Drink was also part of the judging team, along with Bernard Taylor, Head Chef from Lands of Loyal Hotel Alyth.

Trophies for the category winners, Ryan Aitchison, Chloe Bailey, Craig Walker and Jennifer Ramsey were presented by Eileen McBain representing Blairgowrie and East Perthsire Tourist Association. The four finalists were given the chance to demonstrate their winning dishes at this year's Dundee Flower and Food Festival - we are the first school to have had the honour of demonstrating. It was a wonderful experience for the pupils. The winners from each of the categories were given a VIP tour behind the scenes at the Festival and met the Fabulous Baker Brothers on the Sunday.

The judges hope they have found some great Chefs of the future!

"The dish I made was venison olives, stuffed with blackcurrant sausage meat, served with garlic fried greens and herb roast potatoes.

"I tried to make my dish unique and present it in a way that looked different and would wow the judges. I came first overall because the blackcurrant jam complimented the venison and, according to the judges, "was a dish they couldn't stop eating!"

They were so down to earth and even offered me the chance to be their apprentice down in England! Jamie Andrew Visit

Jamie Andrew is a Scottish mountaineer who had his hands and feet amputated following a horrific accident in the French Alps. Miraculously, despite his disability, Jamie has carried on with his mountaineering career and has made some amazing ascents all over the world, raising many thousands of pounds for charity along the way. In September, Jamie came to speak to our senior pupils.

"I thought that this talk was very inspiring, especially towards the end when Jamie talked about how he recovered from a traumatic event and got back into his everyday life. The thing that stood out the most for me was his ability to create achievable daily goals, fulfill them, and then create more difficult goals for the next day.

"He toned down the potentially more gruesome and upsetting parts of his story, but still told it in a way that it had the full effect. Also, his sense of humor and juggling act at the end kept everyone's attention and lightened up the mood. "I thought that Jamie was a great role model for everyone, no matter what their situation. He gave a very composed parration of his story and
