16 pupils from S1 to S3 were invited to DJCAD (Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art and Design) last Friday 13<sup>th</sup> February to take part in the second phase of a outdoor design collaboration between final year IED Interior and Environmental design student Alison Taylor and BHS Art Department.

The aim of the day was for pupils to design and build outdoor structures using a variety of materials taking inspiration from pupils previous suggestions collated during Design in Action brainstorming workshops held in November at BHS.



Pupils identified **Learning**, **Nature**, **Study** and the desire to **Connect** with the school environment as key concepts to explore within their designs and the day was spent indulging in creative thinking, critical questioning and constructive problem solving.

The morning started with a whistle stop tour of the open plan studios where pupils chatted to IED degree students who were responding to a variety of briefs exploring personal identity and sheds.

Pupils used matchsticks, cardboard, toilet rolls, tracing paper and egg boxes to create their models in vertical year groups exploring questions of function, construction, access, sustainability and cost.





Sessions ended with a show and tell presentation where pupils were encouraged to share ideas and evaluate their outcomes as a whole group. Pupils worked alongside degree pupils, tutors and art teachers developing their skills in model making and were encouraged to use

ipads, phones and magazines to broaden their influences and respond to existing co-designs and learning environments from around the world.
