Parent Council



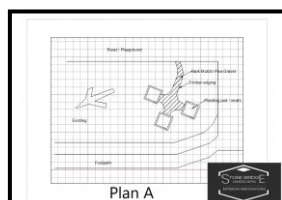

As respect is one of our school values, we want to ensure that children they know how to demonstrate it in all areas of their lives. In the UK children aged between 5-16 years spend an average of 2-3 hours per day watching television, 1-3 hours on the internet, 1-2 hour playing video games and over an hour on mobile phones (not talk), a total of 6.3 hours of screen time per day. It is crucial that we support them in managing their time online and the impact of this time on their mental health, wellbeing, and safety.



Nurtured and Included Citizens

Nurtured and Included Citizens are aware of each other's differences in relation to our protected characteristics. You will all have received a copy of Mrs Farrell's leaflet in relation to our plans moving forward to look at LGBT+ Education within the school. Focusing on promoting equality, reducing bullying and improving the educational experiences of LGBT children and young people, subjects across age groups will now include LGBT identities, issues and history. We are at the very beginning of this work and Mrs Farrell is keen to ensure that parents' views are heard and that you are part of this learning journey with us. All staff are currently participating in additional training as part of Phase 1 of the Scottish Government's implementation.

In implementing this first phase of LGBT inclusive education, Scotland will become a world leader in equality, as the first country in the world to have LGBT inclusive education embedded right across the curriculum. By normalising LGBT lives and experiences, and educating on the issues faced by LGBT individuals historically and presently, children and young people will have a greater understanding and greater respect for everyone and a renewed commitment towards inclusion and equality.

Launched in September 2021, phase 1 of implementation of the recommendations include:

- A basic awareness e-learning course on LGBT inclusive education for practitioners;
- a toolkit of LGBT inclusive education teaching resources; and,
- a centralised website (www.lgbteducation.scot) where resources, training and other relevant information will be hosted and available to all school staff and the wider public, including parents and carers and children and young people.

We will take part in the second part of the training in August and this will form part of the work on our school improvement plan for next session.

Languages Week

Nurtured and Included Citizens ensure that Article 8: Your right to an identity is respected. This identity can include your ethnicity, religion, language, culture, and heritage. For Burns' Day the children across the school learned a song or poem containing words in Scots and they had great fun recording these to share with you on SEESAW. We have thought about all of the languages that we use in school and at home and Base 2 celebrates Languages Week by making French flags, building French places of interest and trying some traditional French food.

Football in the Playground

Over the last few months, we have had an increase in the number of accidents being reported to the office, caused by football being played in the main playground. This is mainly due to the overly competitive nature of how children are playing, resulting in balls flying around injuring those playing peacefully in other areas. We have taken the decision to pause the playing of football in all areas of the playground except for the MUGA. All classes except for P1 are timetabled a slot on the MUGA, so children can still enjoy the opportunity to play football, but in a safe and controlled manner that does not impact upon others. P1 will have a designated area to play since they do not have a MUGA slot. Since introducing this, the number of accidents has significantly dropped. They children have been creative in thinking of other games to play with a ball or other items from their playground boxes. We will be replenishing the boxes soon. After Easter the children will also have a field day to allow them further opportunities. It is important that everyone's right to play and play safely is respected

As you know we are continuing to use SEESAW as a vehicle to communicate with you and to most homework opportunities. The activities on SEESAW cannot be downloaded on to paper copies, but we know that we had high levels of engagement using SEESAW during lockdown. We have noticed a significant reduction in the number of homework tasks being completed across the school and will be sending out over the next few months a survey to find out your views in relation to homework being set. This is a very time-consuming exercise for staff and if only 20-30% of a class are returning homework regularly, then this time could be used more efficiently to prepare for lessons rather than homework. We know that children have very hectic schedules and that parents are very busy, so do not want to keep setting homework tasks that will not be done. What have we been up to?

Base 2 –

Primary 1 have been learning how to tell the time. We are also going to be learning about money and graphs. In Literacy we are learning to write stories and we have discovered stories have a beginning, middle and an end. We are also been learning our double sounds this term. We have also been learning about Scotland and know why Scotland have a thistle for their national flower. We also have learned about Nessie, Kelpies and unicorns! In Art we are going to design our own tartan as you can see in the picture and created a 3D picture – you will love it!

This term we are going to have visitors who specialise in music and we are excited to be learning about this. We are also having visitors from Nil By Mouth who are going to do a special workshop for us.

Primary 2 have been learning more digraph sounds, and even a trigraph – igh! We have been trying hard to answer questions about what we have read. This term we will focus on story writing and describing a character using adjectives. In Numeracy and Maths, we have been focusing on telling the time and working out the hour before and after a time. We are starting to learn about multiplication and division.



Base 3

Primary 3/2 have been learning how to tell the time. P2 have been learning o'clock and half past and P3 have been learning quarter past and quarter to. We played lots of fun time games and created our own class clocks. In literacy, we have been working hard to learn our double phonemes and playing a variety of spelling games. Primary 3 have been learning about adverbs and Primary 2 have been learning about nouns. Our class novel is 'Pugs of the Frozen North' and we have created our own base reading journal. Primary 3 have been working hard to answer comprehension questions on the text, while Primary 2 have enjoyed sharing their likes and dislikes about the story. We created our very own pugs and gave them all their own name. We enjoyed connecting with our school in the Republic of Congo and have been learning about the Congo rainforest. We have been busy creating our own rainforest with kapla, lego and loose parts and drawing rainforest animals by following step by step instructions. We are excited to arrange a virtual call with Baby Steps Primary in Congo to learn some more facts about the rainforest.



Primary 2 have been learning to tell the time! We have been doing so well with o'clock and half past that we even tried learning about quarter past/to! Now we are continuing to practise counting in 2's so that we can master the 2 times table. We have been enjoying our base novel 'Pugs of the Frozen North'. Base 3 have created a journal that we have all had the chance to add our likes and dislikes to. We can't wait to find out what happens next!!

Base 4 –

Primary 3 have been continuing to work on our character strengths of the heart and have been learning how to use the control signals in our paths lessons. We have been learning The Canadian Barn Dance which left us feeling very out of breath! We have been using mindful breathing and understanding how this feels in our bodies. We have been learning how to tell the time in maths, we have created our own watches and clocks. We know o'clock, half past and quarter past in digital and analogue time. We understand the difference between am and pm and we will be looking at calendars and where dates fall in the year. We started our new class novel, The Incredible Shrinking Girl by Lou Kuenzler. We have been transported to a tiny world where the character is the size of a fish finger! We are summarising the chapters and enjoying rich class discussion about our likes and dislikes. We have been keeping up to date with current affairs and watching Newsround, we have learned about the situation with our Prime Minister which has led to lots of interesting discussions. We are doing a mini topic on Scotland and have created art based on Charles Rennie Mackintosh, we have read the Scots book Neeps and Tatties and learned Lament to a Lost Dinner Ticket by Margaret Hamilton. We had a brow time! We are busy planning for our class assembly which is all about peace. We can't wait for you to see it!

What have we been up to?

Primary 4 we have been reading a new novel called "The Incredible Shrinking Girl" which is about a girl who is the size of a fish finger! We are looking forward to finishing it very soon! We have been learning to summarise different chapters and also summarised a well-known story called 'The Ugly Duckling'. We also read 'Neeps and Tatties' which encouraged us to start our new topic. We also got to try some Haggis, Neeps and Tatties during our senses session for Burns Day.

We have started our new topic about conflict and peace. We have enjoyed looking at different conflicts that happen around the world. We even had our own peace wall in our classroom for a morning. We were so glad when it was taken away and we were reunited. We are doing an assembly based on peace and conflict. We have written our very own lyrics to a song that we know you will recognise and learned another song about friendship. We have learned how to use our control signals which help with if we are feeling angry or upset.

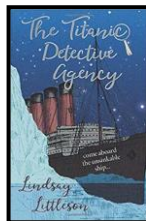
In numeracy we have been learning about time. We can read o'clock, half past, quarter to and quarter past. We have been converting am and pm to 24-hour time. - We also learned to read calendars and find the correct dates for events e.g., our birthdays.

We learned Lament to a Lost Dinner Ticket by Margaret Hamilton which was in Scots. We found it funny and got to include lots of expression when reading it out loud. We hope that you enjoyed watching it on SEESAW.



Base 5

We have been looking at patterns and relationships between numbers, letters and shapes. We have recently started expressions and equations (the beginnings of algebra) where we have been investigating missing values and symbols being used to represent missing numbers. Our new class novel 'The Titanic Detective Agency' by Lindsay Littleton is helping us to become more reflective readers. So far, we have read chapters 1-3 and have been finding out about some of the interesting characters who were aboard the ill-fated Titanic on her Maiden Voyage. Outdoors, we are developing our map reading skills during our weekly orienteering sessions which we are all really enjoying.



Base 6 have been enjoying our Spain topic and have been finding out about the architect Antoni Gaudi and the amazing buildings he designed in Barcelona. In Art, we explored line and pattern in the style of Gaudi and have just moved on to looking at how Pablo Picasso used line and colour as we create portraits in his style. We are also researching key features of different regions of Spain in small groups to make information booklets for visitors. In Maths, we are finding out about 12 and 24 hour time and time durations. Later this term we will also be learning more about multiples, factors and primes as well as 2d and 3d shapes. We are continuing to become more independent learners by working on our numeracy choice grids. In Literacy, we have been taking part in Literature Circles and have been enjoying taking on different roles in the group each week. We have been learning about the poetry of Michael Rosen and have also created our own poems in his style and have even produced our own versions in Scots language.

Base 7 have been working on War and Conflict and have been researching Adolf Hitler. We have been learning about time – specifically, the formula for speed, time and distance. We are wearing our new hoodies well and are getting excited for Ardentinny. Thank you to the Parent Council for their kind contribution to the cost of the hoodies.
