# Message from the Head Teacher

According to artificial intelligence, Renfrew, Scotland is considered a safe place to live, work, visit, raise a family, or retire. We have talked a lot about the role that Al is now beginning to play in our lives and whilst, like the introduction of the internet, it has many advantages, there are also many things about Al that families are finding alarming, particularly in relation to the digital manipulation of images. As technology advances, it is important that children know how to keep themselves and others safe. Al safety, a combination of operational practices, philosophies, and mechanisms, aims to ensure that any developed Al systems and models operate in the manner originally envisioned by the developers without resulting in any unintended consequences or harm. We are helping our children by teaching them the language of character strengths and to understand what these look like in action. Our character strengths of self-control (use caution and use control) teach us that, it is important to not say or do anything that may have a negative impact on others and that you might later regret. Learning at school is all about making mistakes, within a safe and nurturing environment, where you can reflect upon your decision and choices and be supported to make the best choices that will result in positive outcomes. When children are allowed to experiment and make mistakes, they have the opportunity to explore and create innovative solutions. The experience of making mistakes and failures encourages children to seek new approaches, explore unique ideas, and develop their creative thinking skills. In fact, letting children learn from their mistakes helps build resilience and is essential to raising a confident, capable, happy, and successful adult. When children are given the opportunity to struggle and sometimes fail, you allow them to develop important social and emotional skills. Since COVID, we have noticed an increase in children who struggle socially, particularly with friendship. During COVID, their lives became very narrow and close to home and while that may have kept them safe, it robbed them of the variety and complexity of life that is a needed as a healthy part of development. In terms of social skills, children are out of practice. Part of how they learn how to get along with others is by spending time with people, making friends, and by being with people they wouldn't necessarily choose to be around. We know that not everyone in our school community will get on with each other or like each other, but to prepare our children for life, they do have to learn how to respect everyone. How we interact with each other as adults, sets an example to our Arky Stars and helps them to see our school values in action. Success, Team, Attitude and Respect. Thank you for the role you play in supporting our school community. The more we learn, the brighter we shine!



# **Bikeability**

P7 children have been participating in Bikeability session at Level 2, which includes an on the road exercise. This includes children learning how to:

- \* identify and respond to hazards
- \* comply with signals, signs and road markings
- \* manage risk when cycling
- \* negotiate junctions
- \* communicate with other road users

We hope that these life skills will not only help our children to be respectful road users, but will also develop an awareness of and the skills necessary to keep themselves safe.



# **Outdoor Learning**

Part of learning outdoors, is allowing children to participate in play which they find challenging, risky and sometimes scary. We are lucky to have many outdoor areas for children to develop their skills. Risky play helps children to assess their environment and the consequences of their actions. We certainly don't want to put children at risk, so their safety is always our number 1 priority. Beastie Street and our den building areas are put to very good use.



# **Safe Citizens**

Arkleston pupils were part of a team of children who worked with I Am Me in the creation of the Renfrewshire Keep Safe Scheme. The Keep Safe initiative is the first of its kind in Scotland. It supports and encourage disabled, vulnerable and elderly people to keep safe and enjoy ordinary day-to-day life and activities without fear of abuse, intimidation and harassment. Many local business display the Keep Safe logo in their windows and staff are trained to support those in need in their community. Have a look round Renfrew to see if you can spot the Keep Safe places. It is important to us that children know their community well in order to feel safe within it. P7 have been out mapping their local area and looking at key landmarks that help them to navigate.



# **STEM Club**

20 P4-7 children have had the opportunity this term to work with Mr Maycock, one of the physics teachers at Renfrew High. They have been designing their own racing cars and then testing their aerodynamics and car safety on a roll-out racetrack. Children then re-design their cars to come up with a winning design. This is helping children to think about the real life applications of Science Technology Engineering and Maths.

# What have we been up to?

Base 2 This term will be very busy in Primary 1, as we prepare for the Christmas season and our Nativity. We have already begun practising our songs for our performances of Whoops-a-Daisy Angel. We are so excited to get dressed up in our costumes and show off what we have been learning! In Literacy, we will be finishing learning our single sounds and using our knowledge of these sounds to blend and read CVC words like c-a-t, cat. We have books on our Collins Big Cats logins which will help us to practise our blending at home, as well as in class. In January, we will start to learn some digraph "double" sounds, where two letters make one sound e.g.sh, th, and ch. We will continue working on our reading strategies and working to read our banded books. We have recently begun to work on having a go writing an independent sentence, and we will continue working on this skill this term, too. You can help me at home by reading out simple CVC and tricky words for me to practise writing. In Talk for Writing, we will start to look at learning a new text off by heart and creating a story map for this. We will have a go innovating this story, too! In Numeracy, we will recap our knowledge of addition before moving on to learn about the concept of subtraction. We will explore strategies for subtraction and investigate the link with addition. We will then look at some mathematics topics; 2d and 3d shape, symmetry, fractions and time. While we explore these concepts, we will continue to use and strengthen our calculation skills through our jobs and our Number Talks.

Base 3 We have been busy in Primary 2. In Maths, we have been learning to subtract using lots of different strategies such as concrete resources like Lego, number lines and our 'human calculator' (our fingers). We have started practising using our musical instruments for the upcoming festivities. We have also been learning to play the Boom whackers in music. In Talk for Writing, we have been learning the story of 'Little Charlie and the Lighthouse Keeper', through the mediums of drama and hot seating. We have been acting out the characters from the story, such as *Little Charlie himself and the Seagull*. We are excited to be looking at our new class novel, The Snowman by Michael Morpurgo and work based upon this story. In PE, we have been practising our evasion skills during our rugby sessions with Mrs Powrie. We have been enjoying wearing the tag belts and are able to take these from our opponents to win the game.

Base 4 - Primary 3 This term, we'll be working on an exciting writing task that lets the children practise their skills as young reporters! Our class will be writing a newspaper report about a brave local woodcutter who received a special medal for rescuing Little Red Riding Hood from the wicked wolf. This activity will teach the children how to write factual reports, introduce them to journalistic language and give them a chance to practise asking questions to imagine what the characters would have felt in the story. Our class novel this term is *The Creakers*, a fun and slightly spooky story that will spark imagination and curiosity! The story follows a young girl named Lucy as she uncovers a mysterious world of "Creakers"—creatures that live under the bed and cause all sorts of mischief! Through this novel, children will explore themes of bravery, problem-solving and the importance of facing fears. They'll also learn about friendship, teamwork and how imagination can help us see the world in new and creative ways. In maths, we're focusing on the core skills of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division. We'll also be using mental strategies through "number talks," which help children think flexibly about numbers and develop confidence in explaining their thought processes. You can support your child by practising mental maths at home and encouraging them to share their strategies with you!

Base 5 Primary 4 - have been finding out about Climate Zones in our World for our new topic. We have been looking at the polar regions of Arctic and Antarctica and learning where deserts are in the world. We are also looking at how the world is changing due to global warming. You will be able to see some of this learning at our Base 5 assembly on 29<sup>th</sup> November at 9.30am. We have been working hard learning our lines and songs. We hope you will enjoy it! In outdoor learning we have been learning about dissolving and also symmetry in our environment — it has been lots of fun! In Numeracy and Maths we have been working on more complex calculations using addition and subtraction and soon we will be developing our multiplication skills. We will also be looking at information handling and learning how to present information in different formats. We have enjoyed working on our class novel 'Varjak Paw' we enjoyed Varjak's adventures and are sad that it is coming to an end. In Talk for Writing this term we are learning about how to write an information text. Our model text is 'Rivers of Life' and we are looking forward to finding out all about different rivers around the world and why they are important. We will be researching a river of our choice and writing a report about it. We are really looking forward to creating our Christmas winter trees art for the hall display and learning our songs for the Singalong.

# What have we been up to?

#### Base 5

Primary 5 have had a busy start to Term 2. We have been enjoying learning about Climate Zones in our World topic. The world is split into 3 zones – Polar, Temperate and Tropical. We have been looking at the polar regions of Arctic and Antarctica and learning where our deserts are in the world. As We were surprised to find that the Arctic and Antarctic are deserts! We are also looking at how the world is changing due to global warming. In outdoor learning we completed a range of autumn challenges using found materials in our playground. We are continuing work on our class novel 'Varjak Paw' and have written some super book reviews. Many of the children would like to read the next book in the series which we hope to do next term. In Talk for Writing this term we are developing our skills in writing an information text. Our model text is 'Rivers of Life' and we are looking forward to finding out all about rivers around the world. We will be researching a river of our choice and writing information about it. Our focus in Numeracy and Maths is on developing our mental maths recall of tables as well as completing more complex calculations using our multiplication skills. We will also be looking at information handling and learning how to present information in a graph and chart. We are really looking forward to creating our Christmas art for the hall display and learning our songs for the Singalong. We are looking forward to welcoming you to our class assembly on 29<sup>th</sup> November at 9.30am. The children have been working hard to learn their lines and practise songs.

Base 6 After a successful Harvest assembly we are very much looking forward to a few more opportunities to perform in front of an audience. Every Monday we have been working with Mr Barclay from YMI Youth Music Initiative. Recently we have been practising our music patterns to festive music and trying to perfect our position and instrument swaps. We can't wait to choose our songs for the Sing Along and some of us will be performing in Shopping Centres and Care Homes as members of the School choir.

**P6** are continue to add to their skills as they learn more about what it takes to be a responsible, enthusiastic and inclusive play leader for the younger children in our school.

**P6 & P6/5** had a visit from S6 pupils from Renfrew High School who delivered a short Anti – Bullying input based around the principles of the MVP programme which the pupils will learn more about as the move to high school.

We are very much enjoying their new class novel called *The Firework Maker's Daughter* by Philip Pullman, a fast paced and entertaining adventure story which ties in nicely with our fiery volcano studies. In addition to the exciting storyline, the writer's use of a variety of techniques in the description of setting is a rich source of inspiration for our own Talk for Writing suspense stories.

P6/5 continue to enjoy the dance sessions led by S6 RHS students and look forward to the show at Renfrew High in December.

P6 have now completed their games training with S6 RHS P.E. Students as part of their Hi5 Awards.

Base 6 have been set an independent homework challenge based on their studies of Natural Disasters.

Base 7 We have transitioned into term 2 with a new teacher and some changes but we have enjoyed showcasing our learning from term 1 and building on the skills and resilience which we developed in Ardentinny. Some of us have started our lunch time clubs and have enjoyed the responsibility of providing a variety of clubs for all the different interests in the school. Our clubs include hockey, dance, basketball, gymnastics, football, book club and creative club. We have learned different skills which will help us in achieving our Dynamic Youth Award. Some of us have recently completed our Bikeability training! In addition, we have been exploring our global goals, comparing life underwater to life on land, focusing on the effects of sustainability on life underwater. We have learned that not only do humans face challenges with their senses but humans are impacting animal's senses too. In literacy we have been learning about newspaper articles. Most recently, we looked closely at a local historical event, The Glen Cinema disaster, which we have found extremely interesting. We will use all the skills learned to create our own newspaper article. We have formed reading circles, picking a book of our choice as a group and having different roles within the group, one being answering and creating different types of questions to deepen our understanding of what we are reading. In numeracy, we have looked at different strategies to support our multiplication and division and recently finished angle work with Mrs Smith. We went a walk around the community recently and created a draft map of the local area. We are moving onto working on scale and applying our angle work to create a map of our school and local area to scale. Term 2 will be special for P7 as it is their Christmas assembly. Can you guess what our theme is?

Mr Dougan our Active Schools Coordinator organised and ran several lunchtime and after school clubs last term, which were well attended. He listens carefully to what children want and tries to put on activities to meet their needs and interests. Mr Dougan promotes different sports within our school community and supports the work of our school. He worked closely with Miss Orr and our Healthy and Active Committee.

Our P7 children carried out a survey amongst our school community and this told them the clubs that children attend in or out of school. They met with the children who do not attend any clubs and asked them what kinds of clubs they would like P7 to run within the school. P7 worked in teams to plan and organise their clubs and this has results in 90% of children in our school now participating in a club, enhancing their wider achievement skills. P7 are now running a variety of clubs at lunchtime, which are well attended. All P7 children are qualified Play Leaders, having taken part in training with Active Schools whilst in P6. P7 children will use their experiences as their submission for their Dynamic Youth Awards. These awards will show on their SQA Certification once they are at high school. Well, done to P7 for all of their hard work and efforts.

# **Playground Zones**

Looking at How Good is OUR School, Theme 3 – Our school and community, the children created their play zones for the playground last year. We are now 6 months in and we have noticed a positive impact in the reduction of yellow and red cards given out following playground incidents. Last session, in the 9 months that we collect data, 77 children received yellow cards for playground incidents and 36 children received a red card. At the end of month 2 this session we have had 2 children receive a yellow card and 3 receive a red card for playground incidents. This is a massive reduction.

We looked at the features of effective practice around children and young people being able to contribute their ideas about how our school environment can be improved and how our school building and grounds take account of their ideas which helps them to enjoy being here.
