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#### **Kit-Kaboodle**

### Tips for Reading

**Children who read for enjoyment every day perform better across the curriculum, develop a broader vocabulary and have a better understanding of other cultures.**

- **My child is too young to learn to read yet, but what can I do to set them off in the right direction?**  
Make sure that your child is familiar with language and books so that they can see how enjoyable reading is.
- **Reading aloud to your child:**  
Talking about the words and pictures and sharing ideas about the book
- **Reading Yourself:**  
Children who see adults reading, and enjoying reading, are much more likely to want to read themselves
- **Making sure your child is surrounded by books:**  
You don't need hundreds of books at home, but make regular trips to the library, visit our school library, not just to borrow books but to spend time together browsing and learning to make choices.

Most importantly, talk to your child. Spend time with them, doing simple activities (cooking, making something). As you talk about what you're doing, you are helping them to learn new words. Later, when they see words written down, they have already heard them, and know what they mean.
