





Children's Rights to Play

Children and young people have a right to play. The UN Convention on the Rights of the Child states (in Article 31) that every child should have:

... the right to rest and leisure, to engage in play and recreational activities appropriate to the age of the child and to participate freely in cultural life and the arts.

United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child

Play is how young children make sense of the world. There is also evidence to show that play in early childhood can influence the way your child's brain develops, helping to co-ordinate their mental and physical capabilities. Through play, children and young people of all ages develop problem-solving skills, imagination and creativity, language and observation skills, and memory and concentration. Children and young people use play to test their theories about the world and their place in it.

Play and Transitions

The learning environment in the early stages of primary school should not look or feel starkly different from a motivating ELC environment. The level of provocation might be greater, the interaction might be more challenging, and the experiences on offer might be different.









In Scotland, we benefit from a curriculum model that spans the ELC and the early years of Primary School. The Early Level of Curriculum for Excellence is intended to support the implementation of a responsive, continuous, play-based curriculum for children aged 3–6.



Useful Information

Relaxed School entry from 8.55-9am (prompt) Playtime 10.30-10.45am, Lunchtime 12.15-1.15pm School Finishes at 3.15pm

(Your child will leave via their classroom door in the infant playground and will be handed over by their teacher. Please stand well back to give children space to see their adult).

Please ensure your child knows who is collecting them each day and/or if they are going to aftercare. Pupils going home for lunch can be collected from their class teacher at the side gate (Ashy Path).

Supporting Transition


















Supporting Transition

Encouraging Independence!

Over the next month or so, practise:

- Putting on their own coat, shoes or wellies
- Tidying up belongings, hanging up coat and bag
- Brushing teeth
- Carrying/scraping plates& recycling food waste
- Using a knife and fork



Got a child starting school in August?

I normally do a wee post during the Summer with some suggestions for your child starting school but thought it might be helpful just now given some people have more time on their hands!

- Do they recognise their own name? If not make a sign together for their room and where they hang their jacket at home so that they are used to seeing it.
- If you are going to teach them to write their name please only teach the first letter as a capital- if they learn their whole name in capitals it then takes time for them to unlearn it.
- Remember school is different from when you went, they will unlikely have their own desk but they will be very used to the set up as it's similar to Nursery.
- Label EVERYTHING! I even label the top of Tupperware and the bottom in case my son loses just one part!
- Encourage them to open their own snacks so that they are able to do it at playtime and lunchtime.
- Velcro shoes are best!
- Don't share your concerns with them and don't talk about how they are your baby and they aren't ready! They are taking their lead from you!
- Can they put on their own jacket and zip it up? If not, start encouraging that!
- Can they use the toilet independently and wash and dry their hands independently? Now is the time to work on this.
- When you find out their gym days it's best not to put them in shirt and tie on these days.
- In Scotland all P1s-P3's get a free lunch when you get a menu pop it somewhere in the house and let them know what the choices are each day and decide what they will have together.
