# January 2021

I would like to take some time now to outline what will be happening for our pupils as we move to a period of remote learning.

As you will be aware, we currently have remote learning in place until the 1 Feb. 2021, this will be reviewed by Scottish Government on the 18 Jan. Children of key workers and vulnerable children could have applied for places at the hub.

This lockdown, like the national picture, has seen a significant demand for attendance at the hub. As a result of this we have had to set up and staff 2 hub classes. One for P1-3 in room 1 the other for P4-7 in the modular classroom. For most children attending the hub, it will not be their class teacher. Most class teachers are currently focusing on their own class's remote learning, but I think we have all learnt in recent months to expect change at short notice!

# Remote / Home Learning - what to expect?

Remote learning, is learning that is directed by practitioners and undertaken by children. From the outset of the pandemic, we have adapted learning and teaching to ensure a strong focus on children's mental health and well-being, and engagement, this continues to apply.

At Inchinnan Primary our remote learning aims to offer a combination of 'live' interactions between teacher and learners, through a mix and match, depending on age and stage, of Seesaw, Google Classroom and Microsoft Teams digital platforms, as well as, learning which takes place away from the direct presence of the class teacher.

It will involve a range of learning experiences which take place in a variety of learning spaces, including outdoors and includes active and physical learning.

Learning will be delivered in a variety of ways. It may include reading, doing, creating and inventing, playing, problem solving, observing and investigating with some of the best learning examples not requiring technology at all, although in the current context, digital and online approaches will be commonly used. Although we have already contacting all our families directly about resources including digital ones, if any family has any difficulties/change in circumstances going forward, please get in touch and we will do all we can to support. It is definitely easier this lockdown, in respect of the school building being open and we can access school resources.

We do not expect learners to engage in online learning for the entirety of the school day. Learning may include activities such as research tasks, project work, practical opportunities, discussions and other activities that can be carried out away from a digital device.

We will also be including a variety of opportunities to consolidate, extend and enhance learning, previously taught.

We will have daily registration/check in for every learner, recognising that the format for this may vary depending on the age and stage of learners.

Scottish Government have clearly indicated a change and increase of expectations on schools, for parents in remote learning situations you might notice this increase, we will do our best to balance what is reasonable and possible. We fully appreciate the varying circumstances of individual families and the fact that no two family situations are the same. Parents want the very best for their children and it is important to stress that, in a period of remote learning, parents are not expected to be teachers. We understand that many of you will be juggling work and childcare. This is one reason why there will be variations in delivery between stages and while why no two schools will be doing the same things in the same way, we know this is not a 'one size fits all' situation.

As always learning is partnership between home and school and by working together we will achieve the best outcomes for our children, no matter where that learning is taking place.
