Dear Parents

Welcome to the March/April Newsletter. We have had a very busy couple of months and plans for the final term are shaping up to be even busier. The whole school team are focused on doing everything we can to help and support our children and families as we continue this journey and recovery from the pandemic.

Covid Update

As you will be aware the legal requirement to wear a face covering in most indoor places and on public transport has been replaced as of 18 April with general safety guidance for people. From that point schools should apply the approach within the workplace guidance to the use of face coverings by staff in indoor communal areas in schools. In practice this means that the wearing of face coverings will not be mandatory, but it will remain encouraged in indoor communal areas in line with the workplace guidance. The framework also sets out that a small number of routine protective measures will remain,

Children and staff must stay at home and self-isolate if they:

- have symptoms of COVID-19, whether they feel unwell or not have tested positive, even if asymptomatic
- are required to self-isolate for any other reason in line with the requirements set out on NHS Inform are identified as a close contact and are over 18 years and 4 months and not fully vaccinated.

There is no longer a requirement for schools to issue individual information ("warn and inform") letters to low risk contacts when positive cases are identified, or for them to test prior to returning to the school environment provided they remain without symptoms.

Schools should continue to support staff and children to follow advice on good hand hygiene, and to ensure regular surface cleaning in schools.

Citizenship Committee Groups Update

Our pupils have been working hard at their committee meetings and we have 3 more meetings planned this term. Being a good citizen, participating in projects that help others as well as working successfully with others creates a positive school culture.

School Grounds Committee have spent time weeding the front playground and litter picking within the forest area.

The Digital Leaders/Stem committee had a visit from Renfrewshire's STEM Development officer 'Kirsty Johnson' and they took part in some science activities. Mrs Johnson complimented our school on how engaged and behaved our children were on the day.

Book Week started with a whole school assembly focusing on World Book Day, and the week was rounded off with 'dress as an adjective', this led to much discussion around what an adjective is and how that might look. The school decided to explore this approach this year as we are very mindful of the commercial aspect around these theme days and the additional cost to families this might incur. We were hoping that 'dress as an adjective' offered more scope to limit costs for our families, especially in the current financial climate.

Every class also took part in a book hunt personalised for every class, with all classes having clues to different areas around the school. P7/6 completed a word search with their final clue, to find the name of their book. P5 worked out an anagram as their final clue to find their book. P1-4 found their book hidden within the school at the end of their hunt. The whole week was thoroughly enjoyed by all the children, with a real buzz and engagement by all.
