Dear Parents and Carers,

What a superb first term we have had, with so much going on! I have been so impressed with the way in which our pupils have engaged with their learning and can see so much progress already.

So far this term:

- Primary 7 have selected Lockerbie Manor for their residential and have chosen to have a formal prom this year. They have also ordered their Leavers' Hoodies!
- All pupils have been asked for their opinions on a range of topics in relation to leadership at all levels within the school.
- All pupils have been asked how they feel about writing and have completed a survey about their wellbeing.
- All pupils have selected and taken part in pupil committees, ensuring that the voice of every pupil is
 given a platform. During these committee times they will decide on the things they feel are
 important and the ways in which they can make a positive difference.

- Our teachers have been on a range of courses in order to bring the best and most up to date learning and teaching approaches into school.

- A range of classes have been learning basic cookery skills, finding out how to cut things safely and what kinds of foods are good for our bodies.

- All classes celebrated Maths Week Scotland with a range of engaging activities designed to enthuse pupils and support mathematical learning.
- We worked with Kilbarchan Smile volunteers to celebrate the unveiling of the Mary Barbour plaque at the cairn in the village. This event will soon appear in the Paisley Daily Express, so keep an eye open for it!
- The Eco Committee harvested the seeds from our giant sunflowers! We are going to keep some to replant, give some to families and feed some to the birds. It has been a wonderful experience and we are so grateful to Ella and Matthew's family for their donation of the original plants, what green fingers you have!
- Some families have already benefited from the season tickets that St Mirren football team kindly donated to the school. We look forward to offering this out to other families as the year progresses!
- We have welcomed our families into school for the first Meet the Teacher of the new year! It was great to have you back in the building!
- And......in addition to this we have been spelling, reading, writing, counting, estimating, carrying out science experiments, learning about history, practising our teamwork skills, using Chromebooks and iPads, getting fit and healthy........ and so much more!

Tracking Progress

As many of you may know, the Senior Leadership Team (SLT) meet with class teachers every term to discuss progress, attainment and wellbeing for each child.
