Pope Francis has invited all schools to work together as a school community to think about the ways that we can actively care for our planet and the people who live within it.


In St. Fillan's, we have accepted this challenge and we are a registered 'Laudato Si' school. We have made a commitment/promise to look after our school community and world as best we can. We have been inspired by the COP26 Climate Conference in November and we will endeavour to contribute to the development of the '17 Sustainable Development Goals' through awareness raising and taking action. ## School Vision, Values and Aims.



Our school vision, values and aims are the beating heart of our school and the core beliefs of what we are aiming to achieve. As a Catholic School, we also follow the Be Brave Unleash Creativity Demonstrate Excellence Show/Radiate Enthusiasm 'In Learning, we are growing and succeeding Together.'

'Charter for Catholic Schools' and our core values echo the values contained in the Gospels.

This month, we will focus on our core value of 'Respect' and the Gospel Value of 'Love.' We are looking forward to 'catching' our children going 'Above and Beyond' when displaying these values in their thoughts, actions and words.

Th school aim that we will focus on is: 'Show and Radiate Enthusiasm" and this will be a focus in learning opportunities that are provided in the classroom.



Gospel values are what Jesus said, what Jesus did and what He told us to do. They are at the root of Catholic social teaching and so they are what we abide by behaving towards others here in St. Fillan's. All of the Gospel values begin with and 'derive from Jesus' Law of Love and are a perfect example for how our children should be.

In St. Fillan's, we value and love all of our children. It is important for them to know that they are loved and part of our St. Fillan's family, a community of faith, learning and love. When children feel loved, they feel safe, secure, and happy and they are ready to learn. Having a 'Readiness to Learn' is the basis for all effective learning to take place. Without this, our efforts have no fruition.

One of the most famous ten Commandments is: 'Love one another as I have loved you." This is mirrored in our PATHS Our PATHS (Promoting Alternative Thinking Strategies) Golden Rule which is: 'Treat other people the way that you would want to be treated.' We promote this Gospel value and the PATHS Golden Rule by encouraging our children to make good choices in their thoughts, words, and actions.

## Ready, Respectful, Safe:




In St. Fillan's, our class and playground charters are founded upon the three key principles of our children being: Ready, Respectful, Safe. Our school rules/expectations of: Kind Words, Kind Feet, Kind Hands and Kind Heart also fit into this expectation.

The children have worked collaboratively to create a set of expectations around each of the three principles. The children know this as: the 'St. Fillan Standard' and this is how we expect our children to behave.

Our children know that this cannot be achieved in isolation, and we all need to work together as a team and a family to support one another in making good choices. Our children also understand that they each have the right to play but that each child has a part to play as part of the collective responsibility to ensure that a successful playtime is experienced by every child.

This term, we have been focussing on the principle of being 'Ready' and the children have been working hard like little bees to earn house tokens which will earn them an extra playtime if they are successful in their mission!





## Lunchtime Arrangements:

Free school meals are now available to all children in Primaries 1 to 5 as per Scottish Government funding. A copy of the school lunch menus has been circulated and are posted on a Sunday evening via the Fillan Bear and Parent Council Facebook Page as a reminder.

It would be really helpful if a discussion was facilitated at home around a child's lunch choice. Class Teacher's reinforce the choices and provide an explanation at the beginning of each day, but often children will select a choice and we have noticed later on in the day that the children do not appear to like their choice, and therefore refuse to eat their lunch. We are no longer a 'Cooking Kitchen' and as such, we do not have any extra lunches or alternatives to offer the children.

We thank you for your continued understanding and support with this.

#### Lunchtime Slips:

We have a duty of care in ensuring that our children make a reasonable attempt to eat the main part of their lunch at lunchtime. Whether this be as part of a school lunch or a packed lunch which has been provided from home. A school day can be long, and we would want for our children be feel nourished, energised, and ready to learn.

We have reviewed our policy and practice and created an 'Un eaten Lunch Slip' that will be issued to children who have not eaten the main part of their lunch (main meal, sandwich, wrap etc) as we feel it is important that parents/carers are aware of this situation. Our Lunch Hall Supervisor, Mrs Edmiston will liaise with the Class Teacher and slips will be discretely placed in the children's schoolbags for you to view/ return to school.

We do appreciate that children's appetites are all different and a child's ability to eat their lunch is dependent upon many things including the way they feel, if they had a big snack at playtime, if they feel unwell, if they have specific medication etc. Please also be advised that no child will ever be forced to eat anything that they do not wish to eat. However, we feel that it is important that our parents/carers are updated with this information.

## Place 2 Be: Children's Mental Health Week:

Children's Mental Health Week is Scotland begins on <u>Monday 7<sup>th</sup> February to</u>

<u>Sunday 13<sup>th</sup> February 2022</u> and the central theme being explored this year is:
'Growing Together.' The idea is to encourage our children (and families) to consider how they have grown and how they can help others to grow. This fits in perfectly with the promotion of our Gospel value of Love.

Mrs McPherson will launch the week's interactive activities through an online Assembly and classes throughout the school will be focussing on learning outcomes around the importance of having 'good mental Health.'

The children in Primaries 4 to 7 will create their own 'Self Care' as it is crucial that they are encouraged to look after themselves and that they 'fill their own cup' before being able to support someone else.

It would be great if families were able to facilitate a 'Dinner Table' Conversation around self-care and its importance in maintaining good mental health and wellbeing.

"Self-care is all about what you can do to help yourself feel better or to keep yourself feeling good. It's a way that we can look after our own mental health and wellbeing. It can help your body and mind to relax, drift away, or be more energised."

## Cyber Resilience and Internet Safety:

Cyberweek takes place on <u>Monday 28<sup>th</sup> February to Friday 4<sup>th</sup> March 2022</u>. During this week, the children will engage in activities related to their personal safety when engaging in online activities in terms of using a device.

They will learn about the three key principles of: Recognise, React and Recover.



All classes will also take part in awareness raising during Internet Safety Day which takes place on <u>Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> February 2022</u>. Learning around this theme consists of the children considering their own behaviours when using a device in order to keep themselves and others safe. Learning experiences will focus on the children knowing and understanding the three principles of: Sade, Smart Kind and how they can apply these to their online conduct.




## St. Benedict's Young Sports Leaders Programme:
