

Reading and Writing Difficulties




This is the 6th version of iPad Apps for Learners with Dyslexia/Reading and Writing Difficulties to be produced since it was first launched in October 2013. The 'Wheel of Apps' is not comprehensive, but attempts to identify relevant, useful apps and to categorise them according to difficulties faced by people with dyslexia. Note that some apps address a range of difficulties. To save space, we have not placed individual apps into multiple categories, but have listed them under a single category that is particularly relevant to the app. Links on the electronic version are 'clickable' and will take you to iTunes, where you can find out more about the individual apps.
