At Dundonald Primary and Early Years Centre we want **everyone** to feel **nurtured** (Article 9), **included** (Article 23) and **involved** in all aspects of early years and school life. **Everyone** has the right to engage in **high-quality learning**, to **achieve success** (Article 29) and to experience **positive relationships** (Article 4 and 5). We aspire to be a school of excellence where the children are at the heart of all that we do.

## Starting Early Years

## How and When Do I Apply For an Early Learning and Childcare Place?

Registration week for children who will be aged 3 or 4 (in the new school year) takes place in at the beginning of March each year. Details of when and where to register are widely publicised on South Ayrshire's website, twitter account, Early Years noticeboards and noticeboards in public places such as libraries and GP surgeries. Parents and carers are requested to make a single application to the EYC/funded provider centre of their choice.

## When will my child be eligible to start?

#### 4 Year Olds

If your child's date of birth is on or between 1 March 2021 and 28 February 2022 he/she will be eligible for a funded early learning and childcare place from August 2025

#### 3 Year Olds

If your child's date of birth is on or between 1 March 2022 and 28 February 2023 he/she will be eligible for a funded early learning and childcare place the first Monday after their third birthday (unless a public holiday or in-service day).

If your child's 3<sup>rd</sup> birthday takes place during the school year, we will contact you a few weeks before your child's birthday to arrange a time for your child to visit our Early Years Centre.

## After Your Child Starts the EYC – Personal Learning and Care Plan

Within 28 days of your child starting the EYC, you will have the opportunity to speak with your child's Key Worker over the telephone.

This will be an opportunity to discuss your child's learning and progress and to create your child's care plan. Your child's care plan will then be reviewed as required and updated at least every six months.

## How Can I Help My Child to Settle into Early Years?

By working together, we can help to ease the children's transition from home to Early Years.

In order to support your child in starting (or returning to) Early Years, there are lots of practical things which parents can do:

- Start talking to your child about 'when you start early years...' and describe all of the fun things we will do, such as: art and craft; playing with water and play-dough; reading stories; playing outside; making new friends;
- Take time to walk up to the Early Years Centre with your child- allow your child time to become familiar with the routine of walking to EYC;
- Speak your child about how much the staff at Dundonald EYC are looking forward to welcoming her/him ©;
- Encourage your child to talk about Early Years and the things they are looking forward to;
- Reassure your child that we all feel a little nervous when things are new. However, by talking to each other and by knowing that the people around us are here to help, it will be okay;
- Please provide your child with a little back-pack containing a full change of clothes and a carrier bag containing wellington boots;
- Please ensure that all of your child's belongings are labelled with your child's name (jacket, wellies, clothes, back-pack).

#### **Attendance**

Regular attendance at our EYC is encouraged. If your child is absent from EYC for any reason, please contact us via telephone to let us know.

## Health and Safety

#### **Arrival and Collection**

Children in our Early Years Centre (EYC) should be brought to school and picked up by one responsible adult. When you drop your child off, please let our EYC staff know who will pick your child up. If the adult collecting your child needs to change unexpectedly, please contact the school via telephone.

Our drop-off and pick-up times are staggered which helps to avoid the door becoming too busy in the morning or afternoon.

Drop-off time: Between 8.45am and 9am Pick-up time: Between 2.45pm and 3pm

#### **Car Park**

The school car park is strictly for the use of staff and blue badge holders. This is to limit the traffic within our car park which helps ensure the safety of all children.

#### First Aid

Where children or staff require first aid, our trained first aiders in our EYC will provide this. Our first aiders will wear the appropriate protective equipment, such as gloves and an apron. Hand hygiene is always carried out before and after providing first aid. Our Early Years Practitioners are trained in Paediatric First Aid.

## Snack and Lunch

#### Snack

Children will be provided with a healthy snack each day in the EYC. Our children enjoy snack time as this is an opportunity to sit down together, to socialise, to chat and to learn about healthy eating.



We provide children with milk every day.

Our Snack Menu can be found on our school website on the EYC page within the 'Classes' section. It can also be found by clicking <u>here</u>. If you would like a paper copy, please speak with a member of staff. Please inform EYC staff if your child has any allergies or dietary requirements. Water is always available as an alternative to milk. Other drinks will only be given if the child has a medical condition.

### Lunch

#### **FREE SCHOOL MEALS**

Free school meals are available to all children who attend Dundonald EYC.

When you drop your child off in the morning, a member of our early years team will ask you if you would like to order a school meal for your child.

South Ayrshire's Early Years lunch menu is available in the Parents' section of our school website or by searching online for 'South Ayrshire School Lunches Early Years'.

## **Packed Lunches from Home**

Children may wish to bring a packed lunch from home. If your child would like to bring a packed lunch from home, please may we ask that your child brings his or her lunch to early years in a packed lunch box or plastic box/tub, clearly labelled with their name?

This allows us to place your child's lunch straight into the fridge.

We will provide water or milk for your child to drink.



We have several children with severe nut allergies in the school and early years centre. Please may we ask for the support of all families in making sure that children's packed lunches do not contain nuts or nut based products? This includes Nutella, cereal bars or other nut based products.

## DRESSING YOUR CHILD FOR THE EYC

Please dress your child in comfortable clothing for play in the EYC, which also allows easy access to the toilet. Tracksuit bottoms or leggings are great.

Polo shirts printed with our EYC logo are available from: Schoolwear Made Easy (online) or Ayrshire school wear, Kilmarnock

The children have the opportunity to participate in various activities, some of which will be messy.

Our children also have access to the outdoor play area every day – please may we ask that children are dressed warmly – our Scottish weather can be changeable and it can quickly become cold.

Please send your child to the EYC with a small back-pack each day containing:

√ a full change of clothing, including socks and pants.

We would also be grateful if your child could bring a pair of wellington boots in a carrier bag.

Each child has a peg on which we will hang jackets, back-packs and carrier bags containing wellington boots.

If your child has a puddle suit which he/she could wear to the EYC, this would be very helpful. For children who don't have puddle suits, we can help provide these.

Please label all of your child's items of clothing and shoes with his/her name.

#### Suncream

During the summer months we would also encourage you to apply sun cream when the weather is hot. It helps if children arrive at EYC with their suncream applied, as there will be times when the children are going straight outside to play. We have an "Application of Sun Cream Policy" which is available for you to see at any time.

## **Emergency Contacts**

When you enrol your child, you will be asked to provide us with the name, address and telephone number of a contact person in case of emergency.



It is essential that this information is kept up to date should we need to contact you if your child becomes ill.

## **Medical Information / Medication**

If your child has a medical condition – including allergies - please ensure you inform the EYC staff to enable them to provide appropriate care. If your child requires medication during his/her time at the EYC – please discuss this with the staff. It is essential for you to keep us up to date with relevant medical information.

#### **Minor Accidents/Upsets**

Should any accidents occur when your child is at the EYC, you will either be telephoned or informed when you collect your child. All accidents are recorded in our 'Accident Record'.

#### Illness

The EYC follows Health Protection Scotland Guidance for Infection Prevention and Control in Childcare Settings. It is very important that parents / carers do not bring sick children to the EYC.

Parents / carers are asked to inform the EYC of any infectious illnesses to allow us to inform other parents and staff if necessary, for example, if your child is ill with slapped cheek or chicken pox.

If your child becomes ill at our EYC, we will contact you through the emergency contact information that you have supplied. If you are unavailable, staff will take appropriate action for the wellbeing of your child. Our Early Years practitioners are trained in Paediatric First Aid.

## **Visits by Medical Staff**

All children in the pre-school year will be seen by the orthoptist. Parents / carers will be informed when they visit the EYC.



#### **Fire Drill**

The EYC class will take part in fire drills as part of the school and will follow practised procedures. We will ensure that all children know what is expected during an emergency.

## Outings

Throughout the year, the children will have opportunities to participate in visits within our local community and beyond. We regularly visit Dundonald woods, Dundonald Castle and our local village – these visits are firm favourites with children, families and staff.

At the beginning of the year, or when your child starts the EYC, you will be asked to sign a consent form for your child to participate in outings.

We will share details of our planned outings with you via letter. We require parent/family helpers when taking the children out for a visit to the woods or an outing – please support us if you can.

Risk Assessments are carried out in consultation with the Head Teacher before every outing.

# Our Early Years Curriculum

## **CURRICULUM**

We will aim to provide a broad, general curriculum which:

- Builds on the individual child's previous experience,
- Works in partnership with parents,
- Creates a welcoming stimulating and positive learning environment,
- Provides a range of carefully planned and child led activities which develop the skills and interests of each child.
- Teaches children to be successful, self-confident and independent through praise and encouragement.



Children come to our EYC with a wide range of experiences. The EYC staff and parents will work in partnership to provide a suitable curriculum using 'A Curriculum for Excellence 3 – 18'; 'Pre-Birth to Three Curriculum'; 'Building the Ambition' and 'Realising the Ambition' as guidelines. Our practice is also informed by the 'Health and Social Care Standards'.

We will offer a wide range of fun and engaging play and activities which enable children to learn effectively. At all times children are encouraged to be successful, self-confident and independent.

Play is at the heart of what we do; we encourage children to learn and develop their skills through play both indoors and outdoors.

In Scotland, our curriculum is defined as the totality of all that is planned for children and young people from early learning and childcare, through school and beyond.

Our curriculum is divided into these main areas:

- Mathematics
- Language including Literacy and English and Modern Languages
- > Health & Wellbeing
- Social Subjects
- Sciences
- > Technologies
- > Expressive Arts
- Religious and Moral Education



Learning activities are planned in consultation with children, taking into account their previous learning and individual needs.

Staff engage in high quality interactions with the children and seek to enhance the children's learning through play. Staff observe children daily and take note of achievements and needs of individual children. This information helps inform future planning to support each child's development. We record each child's learning and achievements in their profiles – our children call their profiles their 'Special Books' – we share these with children and families regularly on an informal and formal basis.

## ICT

In the EYC the children enjoy learning about technology through play. As well as using many interactive toys the children acquire skills through use of the computer, i-Pads and other engaging and interactive forms of technology in the EYC.

## Partnership with Families

Working in partnership with families is our very first priority in Dundonald.

EYC staff are in daily contact with parents / carers and are available to discuss your child's progress or any concerns you may have.

Throughout the year, there will be the opportunity to be involved in other activities in the life and work of our school community, for example, through Christmas Fayres or by joining us on outings as an adult helper.

EYC news and events is shared via regular newsletters. We value parents / carers comments and we look forward to having the opportunity to discuss ways in which we can enhance our activities in the EYC.









## Supporting Children

If your child requires support with any aspect of his or her learning or development, we are here to help. We work in close partnership with families at all times and we have a child-centred approach to supporting each and every child.

We also work in close partnership with your child's named person, the Health Visitor, who (for most of our children) is Jenna Sim. Our EYC also has close links with other support services, such as: Speech and Language Therapy; Educational Psychology and Occupational Therapy.

## Positive Behaviour

Our policy in Dundonald Primary and EYC is to promote Positive Behaviour through praise and encouragement. We reinforce good behaviour and children learn to share, take their turn and respect the feelings of others.



## How can I help as a Parent/Carer?

In Dundonald EYC, we are extremely grateful for the support which we receive from families. Parents and carers help by:

- Keeping us up to date with any changes to address, telephone number, email address or medical conditions.
- Informing us if emergency contact number changes.
- Clearly labelling their child's clothing/footwear.
- Informing us if a child is being collected by another adult.
- Encouraging your child to talk about their experiences at the EYC.
- Sharing your child's learning from home with us via online Learning Journals.
- Using designated entrances for the EYC (drop-off is between 8.45-9am and pick-up is between 2.45-3.00pm).
- Supporting your child to be independent in washing his/her hands and with toilet learning.
- Encouraging your child to dress himself/herself. Recognising own clothes, knowing which way round jumpers are worn, fastening zips and buttons are all very helpful in a busy early years centre.
- Supporting the work of our Parent Council.

## Supporting Your Child's Learning:

Parents are the first, and most vital, teacher any child has. Research shows that children do better at School and throughout life when parents take part in their learning.

In Dundonald Primary and EYC, we are committed to working in close partnership with parents.

Our aim is to support parents / carers as their children's first and most important educators by involving them in their children's education and in the full life of the setting.

There are many different ways in which you can support your child's learning, examples include:

- talking together and sharing a story
- talking to children about how they feel and what they've enjoyed learning or exploring
- praising them if they do well
- using numbers in everyday life e.g. counting objects, counting forwards and backwards, telling the time, using money
- encouraging and supporting involvement in groups and activities in the local area

If you have any concerns about the safety and wellbeing of a child in the EYC, please speak to the EYC staff. All EYC staff take part in regular Child Protection training.
