| This term, we will be learning a Scots poem, "A Dug, A Dug" by Bill Keys. Pupils can practise reciting this at home to family and friends. They are encouraged to use appropriate pace, volume and to add expression. | Each week, we will be working on a phoneme, spelling rule or set of tricky words. Pupils can practise these using a variety of activities. Please see the spelling list on Learning Journals. | This term, we will be exploring the structure of a Losing Tale and focussing on openings and endings of imaginative stories. As we will be working on adding direct speech to our own stories, it would be great if pupils could practise this skill by writing a conversation they have heard on a video clip or heard in their daily life. |
| Numeracy and Mathematics P5 will continue to explore the link between fractions, decimals and percentages this term. Pupils are encouraged to look out for examples of these in the environment, eg. in shops, supermarkets, posters and leaflets. | Health and Wellbeing In school we regularly explore Children's Rights. Have a look at the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child: https://www.unicef.org.uk/what-we-do/un-convention- child-rights/ Talk about the rights of children in Victorian times. Discuss how they are different from children's rights today. | Context/Skills Based This term, we will be learning about life in Victorian Scotland. Pupils can choose an aspect of this topic, eg. school life, homes, industry, toys and games and prepare a short talk that they can present to the class. This might be a PowerPoint, a poster or a model. |
| Other Discrete Subject Learning As part of our Scottish Celebration we will be learning Scottish songs and poems. Ask family members if they remember any Scottish songs or poems from when they were at school or know any Scots words. Learn some if you can! | Helping at Home Every Wednesday we are asking pupils to bring a waste free snack such as a piece of fruit or food in a reusable container. Please encourage pupils to pack themselves a waste free snack each Wednesday morning. | Being Kind We encourage kindness and inclusion from all our pupils.
