Pupil Equity Fund

You may have read in the media about the continuation of the Government’s Pupil Equity Fund. This is additional money given to schools with the aim of reducing the poverty related attainment gap. Over the past year we have been focusing on targeted language interventions and enriching the literacy provision at the school. The impact of these has been very positive. Next year we would like to focus on addressing the gap in Numeracy through a variety of interventions and approaches and providing opportunities to develop Health and Wellbeing with targeted individuals. Forest and Farms Fortnight
