#### <u>Literacy</u>

This week we have been focusing on some of our trickier digraphs 'wh', 'ph', 'ay', 'ai', 'oy' and 'oi'. A digraph is when **two** letters come together to make **one** sound. It would be great if you could watch the Geraldine Giraffe links to recap on these tricky digraphs. We have also enjoyed working with a partner to '**think**, **say** and **write**' some words containing these digraphs, CH: Can you use the words in a sentence? I wonder what you will find in your house and what words you can think of to write containing these sounds. Have fun:)

We have also been practising to write the long date and the short date. It would be great if you could have a look around the house for items recording the date, month and year eg, food expiry dates, calendars, newspapers and magazines.


#### Topic





# KITCHEN SKILLS by age

## PRESCHOOL KIDS (2-5 YRS)

- Stirring batter in a bowl
- Rinsing and staining fresh fruits and vegetables
- · Pouring liquid ingredients
- Spreading peanut butter and jelly on bread
- Mashing potatoes and other cooked vegetables
- Rolling bread or pie dough
- Using cookie and biscuit cutters
- Whisking pancake batter
- Cutting soft fruits and vegetables with a dull butter knife or plastic knife
- Measuring liquid and dry ingredients

- Whisking eggs
- Frosting cupcakes and icing cookies

YOUNG COOK (6-8 YRS)

- Mixing cookie dough and brownie batter
- using a can opener, juicer and garlic press
- Grating cheese with a box or hand grater
- Peeling fruits and vegetables
- Mixing and rolling pie and tart dough
- Making fresh pasta dough and using a hand-cranked pasta machine
- Melting chocolate in microwave
- Whipping cream with a hand mixer
- Making ice cream with a counter top
   ice cream maker
- Using paring or other small knives
- Boiling eggs and pasta
- Frying eggs and grilled cheese sandwiches

Good cooks keep everything in the kitchen clean this is called food hygiene

# BEFORE YOU START

Wash your hands with warm water and soap then dry them. Make sure your nails are clean;

- before you start to cook
- V after handling raw food
- after going to the toilet
- when you cough, sneeze or blow your nose



An apron keeps food clean and protects your clothes. Look at people who handle food in shops. What do they wear on their heads? Why?

# CLEANING UP

- Wash and tidy up as you go along.
- Keep surfaces clean.
- Always use clean cloths and tea towels.
- Wash all utensils with hot, clean, soapy water.
- Begin with the cleanest dishes.
- Use a clean tea towel or paper towels for drying.
- Wrap up food waste and seal in a bag before throwing away.

Water should be hot but still comfortable to your hands. Cold water does not clean well. Can you think why?

# Do not lick your fingers!

Even though you can't see them, microbes on your hands can quikly spread and make you or other people ill. Keep your hands clean.

> Did you know that a sneeze can travel at over 100 miles per hourt

- Put on an apron before you start cooking.
   Tie back long hair.
- ✓ Do not wear jewellery.
- Do not sneeze or cough over food - this can spread infections.
- Make sure your work area is clean and tidy.

# ALWAYS REMEMBER

- Do not rush or run in the cookery area.
  Keep tidy and organised.
- Take care with hot pans and dishes.
- Be care ful with sharp knives.
- Think keep your mind on what you are doing.
- Use special oven gloves when moving hot dishes or pans.
- Listen to instructions and follow them carefully.
