There are three types of Scottish Apprenticeship



Going to college

If your young person is keen to continue learning after school, college can be a great option.



Going to university

One of the progression routes after school or college is university



Straight into work


Some young people might be keen to enter straight into employment.

Self-employment

Volunteering

Volunteering can be a great next step for your young person to develop skills, experience and confidence.

It can also help them understand if that type of work is the right thing for them.



Other training options


Other options are available to develop skills, experience and confidence.
