	Children will develop and improve listening and talking schools through presentations on topics which are important to them Children will work on listening for instructions. Children will continue to explore a variety of spelling rules and strategies; they will explore phonemes and graphemes to deepen their understanding of specific sounds. Children will be given the opportunities to read for enjoyment by selecting texts of their choice. Children will develop confidence in sight vocabulary, blending and segmenting through their reading books, focusing on specific phonemes and tricky words, to gain more fluency in reading. Children will continue to explore upper- and lower-case letters and ensuring that both match up correctly. Children will increase their awareness of punctuation and direct speech to develop their expression in reading. Children will develop their writing by using adjectives regularly during Talk for Writing and photo Fridays. They will be exposed to model texts in talk for writing to develop their writing in a particular genre.	 Children will learn about place value using concrete materials for numbers to 100/1000 Children will learn strategies for addition and subtraction Children will learn about the properties of 2D and 3D shapes – including edges, sides and corners. Children will develop an understanding of multiplication and division using concrete materials and games. They will learn the 2,3,4,5 and 10 x tables Children will develop skills in measuring in cm and m and using correct devices to measure.
