

Litter Policy

Rational : we need a litter policy in order to prevent litter, which can kill animals and other creatures, as well as making areas (such as parks) harder to enjoy. Litter also causes pollution, which is a real problem for everyone.

Article 27 States Parties recognize the right of every child to a standard of living adequate for the child's physical, mental, spiritual, moral and social development.

Article 31 States Parties recognize the right of the child to rest and leisure, to engage in play and recreational activities appropriate to the age of the child and to participate freely in cultural life and the arts.



AIMS OF THIS POLICY

- To encourage everyone in our community to help fight litter
- To create a cleaner area for our community
- To Clarify the responsibilities of everyone in our community

RESPONSIBILITIES

Eco Committee

- Run an annual poster campaign to advertise our desire to reduce litter in our community.
- Develop a rota for our “litter police”.

Janitor

- Empty/throw out rubbish bins daily.
- Supervise litter police during break and lunch times.

Head Teacher

- Provide a suitable number of bins around the school area.

Every member of the community

- Use the bins provided.
- Don't litter.

Litter is the act of having rubbish and, instead of putting it in the bin, throwing it on the ground. Please stop littering as it is harmful to our community and wildlife.

DON'T LITTER TIPS

- If there is no bin nearby then put the litter in your pocket until you see one.
- If your litter is reusable e.g. glass bottles, paper or cans; don't put it in a regular bin, put it in a recycle bin.
- If you see someone else littering, make them pick up their litter.
