



# A Quick Guide to: Quizlet



Quizlet is a flashcard tool that can do so much more!

Once the set is made up, there are different activities for pupils to use: flashcards, use the 'learn' or 'quiz' tools to generate question practice, play a matching game, use the Q-chat AI tutor.

Teachers can also use Quizlet live or Checkpoint as class activities using the flashcard sets as well as generate practice tests and study guides from uploaded documents.

## Creating a flashcard set

- Select the + icon in the top right hand corner and select flashcard
- There are two options here: a) generate from upload or b) create them yourself
  - a) paste notes or upload a file (e.g. pages from SQA course specification) then select generate. *This will take a few minutes!* You will get a set of flashcards (that can be edited as required using the pencil icon), a set of practice questions and a study guide
  - b) Give your set a title then start entering your terms & definitions. As you type, you can choose from terms & definitions already there, adapt those, add your own words and also add images

## Quizlet Live

- You get a choice to run the activity in teams or individual and then which order definition/term are used
- Pupils can join by scanning the QR code, via link or using a code on the website

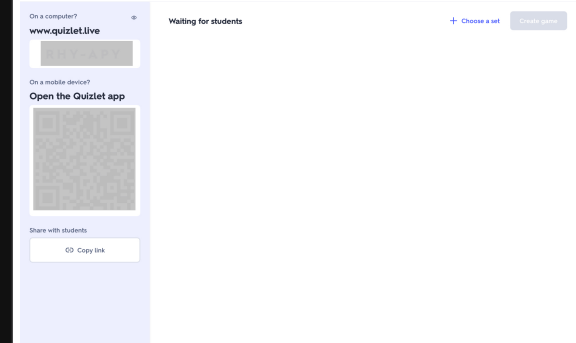
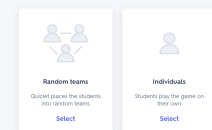
Teams is really good for encouraging discussion: every member gets the same question but only one has the answer. Team progress is shown on teacher screen. One wrong answer returns the team to zero!

## Checkpoint

- You can select which terms you wish to focus on or let it choose 12 random ones
- Pupils can join by scanning the QR code, via link or using a code on the website

Each question has 20s to answer and the teacher moves the questions on once the time is up. Warning here that it is very particular in the typing questions - it must match the flashcard exactly.
