Why do homework?

- > To consolidate class work
- > To develop the skills of an independent learner
- To provide educational experiences not possible in school
- To provide opportunity for parental involvement and support

Our homework

We set a variety of homework activities. The content of the task set may vary from stage to stage and at different times throughout a session but should always be:-

- Clearly understood by the pupil
- At an appropriate level of ability for the child
- Able to be completed without specialised resources
- > A variety of activities
- Reviewed by the teacher with feedback given

All pupils will have a homework jotter. This can be used by parents/carers, pupils and teachers as a means of communication. Please tell us if there is a problem.

Homework tasks may be issued on a Monday for completion by Friday, with the exception of reading, which should be done on a more frequent basis.

Homework may include:

In Primaries 1 - 2

- > Discussion of reading book
- > Practising reading
- > Reinforcing sounds
- Finding out something or bringing in items for a class activity
- > Library books
- Maths activities
- Spelling Jolly Phonics

In Primaries 3 -5

- Practising reading aloud
- > Personal reading
- Spelling
- > Maths tables and maths sheets
- > Personal research

In Primaries 6-7

- Preparation of reading
- > Personal reading
- Spelling English/French/German
- > Maths tables and maths sheets
- > Personal research

TIPS TO HELP YOUR CHILD @ HOME

- > Have a quiet workplace
- > Chose a time when your child is fresh
- > Help your child to get organised
- > Be available to help and encourage
- > Visit the library
- > Visit areas of local interest
- Keep reading to your child
- > Above all show interest and praise good efforts

While homework is important, it should not prevent your child from taking part in the wide range of family activities, out of school clubs and organisations that play an important part in the lives of many children.
