

I landed at Sumburgh on Monday 6th to snow and ice, and the prospect of not getting home as planned.


I've been in Manchester for a week of Teddy catch up. My knees are done having crawled and chased a toddling grandchild, but all very worth it.

FAIR ISLE WEATHER FORECAST

GENERAL SITUATION

Friday 10th March 2023

Northern Scotland lies in a cold, slack northerly airflow to the north of a depression currently clearing east over southern England. As the low continues east, a cold showery northerly airflow will freshen across Shetland tonight. As another depression tracks northeast towards the British Isles, milder air will try to push northeast across Scotland during the weekend though it seems unlikely to reach the Northern Isles with a northeasterly airflow developing by Monday as the low moves into southern Scandinavia. By Tuesday it is likely the Northern Isles will be back in a cold northerly airflow until Thursday when a depression tracking east across mainland Scotland brings a temporary easterly airflow soon backing northerly again.

OUTLOOK FOR THE WEEKEND

Temperatures around 2° Celsius by day and -1° overnight. Slightly less cold Sunday.

FRIDAY 10th: Remaining cold, sunny spells and scattered wintry showers to start becoming more frequent, of snow and heavier this afternoon and evening. F3-4 N'ly winds freshening F5. A cold night with snow showers and a F5-6 N'lv wind.

Sea State: Mostly slight with a 1 to 2 metre N'ly wind swell.

SATURDAY 11th: A cold day with some snow showers and F5-6 NNW'ly winds easing a little through the day. E'ly winds strengthening overnight bringing further wintry showers.

Sea State: Mostly moderate with a 2 metre N'ly wind swell but increasing 2 to 3 metre in the north.

SUNDAY 12th: A rather cloudy raw day with scattered wintry showers and a F5-6 NW'ly wind. Sea State: Mainly moderate with a 2 metre N'ly wind swell.

FORECAST FOR NEXT WEEK

Temperatures around 3° Celsius by day, -1° overnight. A milder midweek at 4° or 5° then colder again. MONDAY 13th: Generally cloudy with scattered wintry showers. Feeling bitterly cold in fresh occasionally strong N'ly winds. Snow possible later and overnight. Sea State: Mainly moderate with a 2 metre NNW'ly wind swell. **TUESDAY 14th:** A cold brighter day with frequent wintry showers and fresh to strong N'ly winds.

Sea State: Mostly moderate with a 2 metre N'ly wind swell.

WEDNESDAY 15th – SUNDAY 19th: Still the odd wintry shower on Wednesday along with sunny spells and fresh N'ly winds. Freshening E'ly winds on Thursday with rain or sleet. Lighter winds on Friday freshening NE'ly for the weekend bringing showers, probably wintry. Sea State Wednesday: Mostly moderate with a 2 metre N'ly wind swell.
