# Fair Isle in the Viking Age and in *Orkneyinga saga*

Judith Jesch, Professor of Viking Studies at the University of Nottingham, has got in touch to let us know about some plans she is hatching. She is currently working on a new translation of *Orkneyinga saga* which will have more extensive and more up-to-date notes than the current Penguin translation. In connection with this she is planning a project focusing on some of the smaller communities mentioned in the saga, including Fair Isle. She and her researchers are hoping to visit several times between February 2024 and May 2025 to learn more about the island, its place-names and its Viking and Norse history. They are particularly interested in creating materials based on the saga, on the place-names and on the archaeology of the island, for schoolchildren, residents and visitors, but with input from islanders and their perspectives. Judith visited the island for one glorious day in August 2021 (see photo) and is very much looking forward to returning. 
Finally get Maavi done. Phew!!!




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
#### Fair Isle Climate 1974 -2023 Temperature and Snow Cover



To me the most obvious is the lack of winter snow and how what there is seems to occur more often in spring rather than winter. This may be happening because the warming of the sea during summer is happening later in the year than previously while winter sea temperatures are lowest later in spring.







#### FAIR ISLE WEATHER FORECAST



## **GENERAL SITUATION**

# Friday 17<sup>th</sup> March 2023

A complex area of low pressure covering much of the British Isles will drift north during the next 24-hours taking one centre just north of Shetland away while the second centre presently off south-west Ireland moves over northern Scotland. As this centre tracks across Shetland towards southwest Norway a strong but brief north-westerly airflow follows before a ridge brings a quieter spell on Sunday. The next Atlantic depression drives further fronts across the Northern Isles during the first part of next week followed by a northerly airflow to end the week as low pressure moves away into southern Scandinavia.

**OUTLOOK FOR THE WEEKEND** Temperatures 7° or 8° Celsius by day 3° or 4° overnight. Sunday a colder 5° with 1° overnight

**FRIDAY 17<sup>th</sup>:** A brighter day possibly with the odd shower otherwise mostly dry. Mainly dry with clear spells overnight, F5 W'ly winds veering NW then N'ly. **Sea State:** Mostly moderate with a 2 metre E'ly wind swell.

**SATURDAY 18<sup>th</sup>:** Mainly dry though rather cloudy with the odd light shower possible later. F5-6 ESE'ly winds. Some rain overnight, possibly with sleet later. **Sea State:** Moderate to rough with a 2 to 3 metre NE'ly wind swell.

**SUNDAY 19<sup>th</sup>:** Early rain or sleet dying out then sunny intervals, isolated showers. Mainly dry and bright. F5 NNW'ly winds easing F4. Risk of an overnight frost as skies clear and wind falls light. **Sea State:** Mainly moderate with a 2 metre N'ly wind swell.

**FORECAST FOR NEXT WEEK** A cool week with temperatures 4° or 5° Celsius by day, 1° to 3° overnight with chance of frost.

**MONDAY 20<sup>h</sup>:** A bright cold start then clouding over later as SE'ly winds freshen with rain arriving from the southwest overnight. **Sea State:** Slight to moderate with a 1 to 2 metre N'ly wind swell.

**TUESDAY 21<sup>st</sup>:** A cold day with scattered wintry showers and fresh ENE'ly winds. **Sea State:** Moderate to rough with a 2 to 3 metre NE'ly wind swell.

WEDNESDAY 22<sup>nd</sup> – SUNDAY 26<sup>th</sup>: The end of the week cloudy with showers, some wintry, and fresh ENE'ly winds turning NE'ly then N'ly by the weekend. Sea State Wednesday: Moderate or rough with a 2 to 3 metre NE'ly wind swell. Dave Wheeler
