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



The isle will be very busy the next couple of years, between FIBO works, BT works starting very soon and then 2 years of major works at the Haven. I spend the afternoon making soup and baking in anticipation of Gina and Glen's visit this weekend. I also plan a few things to make for Harvest this weekend. Hope you all come along to the Hall with lovely produce, homebakes and prizes for the raffle on Sunday!! I'm hoping there might still be some isle fruit there and Fiona better be making her EXCELLENT mincemeat for festive mince pies! We have decided to share the money raised between our usual charity of the Goodwill Children's Village in India and The Red Cross for the appeal to help folk in Libya and Morocco. Watching the news the past week has been hard work, not much good news to see. Our weather can be dreadful but we do not suffer from floods or earthquakes, something I am very grateful for. Hopefully we can help in some small way by sending much needed funds.

Friday arrives with disappointing news that the plane has 'gone tech'. Booo to that. Good news is that they hope to get it sorted and weather should permit a flight Saturday lunchtime to get our visitors and the high school kids home. I know Grace particularly enjoys the harvest weekend so I really hope that the plane is fixed and flying in time!

Next week will be nice and busy, Hurtigruten's ship *Maud* is due on Tuesday with 398 passengers, we have an important isle meeting and our friends from Chroma are due back for a week of music and creativity based around *El Gran Grifón*, the Spanish Armada ship wrecked here on the 27th September 1588 – 435 years ago this week.



FAIR ISLE WEATHER FORECAST



GENERAL SITUATION

Friday 22nd September 2023

A depression near Shetland will drift northeast as a filling feature, a weak short-lived ridge following east on Saturday. A vigorous depression slow-moving southwest of Iceland, drawing in the remains of ex-hurricane Nigel, then drives its fronts east on Sunday. Low pressure is forecast to remain slow-moving to the northwest and north of Scotland for the first part of next week maintaining a strong south-westerly airflow across Shetland. This eases mid-week but soon strengthens southerly as a small low centre swings in off the Atlantic towards northwest Scotland, quickly followed by a second centre maintaining unsettled autumnal conditions.

OUTLOOK FOR THE WEEKEND

Temperatures 13° Celsius by day 11° overnight.

FRIDAY 22nd: A cool and rather cloudy day with blustery showers. Windy with W winds veering NW and increasing F6. Windy with further showers overnight.

Sea State: Building moderate or rough with a 2 to 3 metre NW'ly wind swell.

SATURDAY 23rd: Showers dying out as F5 NW winds slowly

ease, gradually backing F4 SW with brighter spells developing.

Sea State: Moderate or rough with a 2 to 3 metre NW'ly wind swell.

SUNDAY 24th: Mostly cloudy, dry at first but rain later as S winds freshen F5.

Sea State: Mostly moderate with a 2 metre S'ly wind swell.

FORECAST FOR NEXT Temperatures around 13° Celsius by day 10° overnight.

MONDAY 25th: Showers, sunny spells between. Strong SW winds.

Sea State: Rough with a 3 metre S'ly wind swell.

TUESDAY 26th: A bright day with scattered showers. Fresh S winds, occasionally strong at first.

Sea State: Mostly moderate with a 2 metre SW'ly wind swell.

WEDNESDAY 27th – SUNDAY 1st: Strengthening SSE winds bringing rain later Wednesday. Rain clearing to showers Thursday as cyclonic winds become strong W to NW. Rain or showers Friday though winds lighter. Saturday perhaps starting fine before more wet and windy weather follows for Sunday with chance of gales.

Sea State Wednesday: Mainly moderate with a 2 metre SW'ly wind swell. Later becoming SE'ly and building rough.
