

Fair Isle Marine WhatsApp records summary

The Fair Isle Marine WhatsApp group has been active for over a year now and is a great place for the community to add photos of interesting finds along the Fair Isle shoreline (or elsewhere).

Since the WhatsApp group began in October 2022, over 40 different species have been identified and reported! These include approximately 8 species of cetacean, 4 species of cnidaria, 3 species of crustacean, 3 elasmobranch species, 10 fish species, 5 mollusc species, one nudibranch as well as some coral, seabirds and terrestrial birds too.

At the end of this summer, towards the beginning of autumn, the Fair Isle Marine WhatsApp group was certainly dominated by lots of exciting cetacean sightings. Between August and November alone, more than 150 white-beaked dolphins, 80 minke whales, 50 Risso's dolphins, 40 harbour porpoises, 8 orca and 3 humpback whales were sighted. There have even been recent credible reports of Beluga whales off the coast of Fair Isle!

These records will help to build up a species image library of the wildlife we have on our shores and monitor some of the changes in biodiversity. We encourage anyone who spots something interesting/different/cool/exciting to please take a photo and send an approximate location or grid reference and either email to fairislempa@gmail.com, or send to the Fair Isle Marine WhatsApp group. There are now 32 members in the group which is great! If you would like to be added to the group, please let either Katie, Martha, Susannah, Fiona or Neil know and keep the updates coming!

FI Bird Observatory Update - 2023 saw us make substantial progress in the rebuild of the Observatory.

Eventually the weather relented and we were able to bring over the remaining modules from Orkney and have them installed. Following upon this we then managed to complete the roof and outside cladding making the building wind and watertight just in time before we entered winter. This was our target for this year and we are pleased to have achieved this.

The next stage in the rebuild will be broken down into 3 phases consisting of us completing internally the mechanical, electric and plumbing works together with the remaining interiors. Work has already commenced on the first phase and overall this stage will take several months to complete.

Thereafter we have to fit out the Obs with its furniture and plenishings allowing us to complete the full rebuild later on next year.

Once we have more certainty on a completion date we will advise every one of the position regarding bookings and the recruitment of new permanent staff. It's good to be in the position whereby we are definitely nearer the end than the beginning of the project with the finishing line now appearing! As ever, can I on behalf of the Obs wish you all the compliments of the season and thank the Isle for

your continuing support and assistance and we look forward to welcoming you all to the new Obs in the not too distant future.


