

After spending 5 months in Denmark, I braced myself for 45 people on an island 25 miles away from any bar or club (don't think the Trench can even be qualified as a club). But, unsurprisingly, Fair Isle has been an absolute delight. This is the first time I'm here in a 'normal' month. Quite refreshing after the combined 2 hours of sleep I had in Denmark. Next month I'll be renovating a house in Ariege (Southern France) with an Irish theatre major where I'll stay for about 3 months, followed by 4 weeks in Indonesia with my best friend, so loads of excitement ahead!

This week, I have been working for Marie, and hats off to her. It's been amazing watching her run her business; she's an inspiration. The online knitting course she made is amazing. A few days after I arrived her friend came from the Netherlands. Having a fellow Dutch person to practice with felt like time was flying by on the knitting machine.

Highlights of my week include painting sessions with John, a nostalgic lunch with Freyja in Shirva (have not been there for years), and visits with family. I have been lending a hand at the school, getting a taste of different roles as I explore potential studies. Oh, and can we please take a moment to celebrate Ander and Luca's times of 2:10 and 1:15 on the monkey bar race course - how impressive! Being back on Fair Isle always makes me feel nostalgic, so I have been watching the old classics to bring back fond memories (Wallis and Gromit of course).

I must say I'm doing very well altogether. It's been an incredible few months and I've learned a great deal about myself. Although I'm only 18, I'm officially declaring myself an adult-in-progress. You see I cracked the code, it turns out being an adult is just a series of well-disguised attempts to remember where you left your keys and pretending to have your life together.

Now, I'm savouring my time on the island—a little holiday before diving into the hard work awaiting me in France.

Thursday 15th: A busy day at work, in the evening I wanted to take Silvia out for dinner, so I booked a nice place and we got all dressed-up. It was wonderful when the cavalry arrived, with some rubber boots for me and with 4 people we managed to push our way out. By the time we escaped the kitchen in the restaurant had closed, so we just went home again and made some dinner. Not the evening we expected but an adventure.

Friday 16th: Up early and drove down to Amsterdam to catch my flight to Edinburgh for Iain's stag do. It was an uneventful trip (which is usually a good sign - with no delays). We all met up at a Chinese restaurant, it was lovely to see Iain and Ross again. After a good meal (Ross and I shared some aromatic crispy duck with pancakes, one of the foods I miss when not in the UK, the Dutch Chinese restaurants do not make such good crispy duck) we headed out for drinks, good to be out in Edinburgh, reminded me of my days as a student there many moons ago.

Saturday 17th: Met up with Annette Sheppard for lunch (it had been about 10 years since I saw her last) so it was great to catch up. Then went out to see Iain, Ross and Iain's friends who were in a bar where you could play games like pool and air hockey. Iain then went with his friends to the Cowgate area of Edinburgh (for those of you not familiar with the city this is one of the nightlife parts of town). Ross and I went to meet up with John Mouat (originally from Braefield in Shetland) who now lives in Edinburgh. I have a lot of happy memories of weekends staying in Braefield when I was at secondary school, then we met up again with Iain and his friends at a bar. After a great Indian meal, Martin (Inge's husband) joined us and gave us all a lift back to John's flat for some great conversation and a few drinks. It turns out that the voice recognition technology of 'Siri' does not cope very well with Shetland accents.

Sunday 18th: Ross and I hung out in the morning until it was time for Ross to catch a train back to Glasgow and me to get my flight back to Amsterdam, then drive home. But it was a brilliant weekend full of meeting up with family & old friends and re-visiting familiar places from my student days.

Monday 19th: Back to work, super busy, there always seems to some crisis somewhere in the world that I need to help out with. After work a friend from work who is based at our site in Limerick in Ireland came back home to join us for dinner, we had an Indonesian take out and a lot of laughs as we share a very similar sense of humour ③.

Tuesday 20th: Working from home today, which means I had time in between meetings to cut up some firewood. Went to my vegetable garden to get some leeks and made a very tasty leek and courgette soup. It is amazing to have so many fresh vegetables from the garden. It has been such a wet winter that the area where Silvia has her Icelandic horses is a sea of mud and one of her horses had been rolling in the mud and was completely covered, hopefully as spring approaches the ground will start to dry out. In the evening Silvia and I went to the gym (which is actually where we first met) and had a very sweaty work out.

Wednesday 21st: More work and meetings; my afternoons/evenings tend to be the busiest as it is when my American colleagues wake up. Will be driving down to Roosendaal in the Netherlands this afternoon as I have some work to do there on Thursday. Looking forward to this weekend as Silvia and I are heading to Germany to visit her best friend who she has known since high school.

Now over to big sister Marin:

As I'm writing this I can barely believe that the sun is actually out here in Copenhagen. I can however believe that I am stuck inside working all day. I cannot complain though: I have been enjoying plenty of walks though this wonderful city, and am very much enjoying my time here.

Last weekend I went for my third dip of the year in the sea, which is as painful as it sounds. It feels like the North Haven on steroids, and after a quick Google I learn that the water here is a shuddering 2 degrees (compared to the tropical 5 degrees of the North haven). Although it is freezing, I love the tingling sensation your body gets once you've gotten some properly warm clothes on. Almost as much as I enjoy the rush of caffeine from the £6 oat milk latte I allowed myself.

I am finishing my master thesis in April, so have taken up boxing to get out of the writer's block I have been having of late. Unlike my prejudice suggested, I only see a few crooked noses, although that could just be genetics. Luckily, people are very welcoming, and I am managing to keep up with the group's chats in Danish. Apart from that, my dear Uncle, or Ian as he is also called, came to Copenhagen and we, together with Lowri and Catarina, went for a lovely Argentinian meal. It was honestly so nice to have a night with family, I don't get that a lot living abroad.

I have also started waitressing in a ramen restaurant, ramen being a Japanese noodle soup, to afford living in this amazing, but money-eating city. Customers keep asking me how spicy our 'spicy ramen' is, but I still get tears in my eyes when a dish had too much black pepper, so I don't think I'm a good reference. On that note, I'd better get back to work!

And finally over to middle sister Anne:

Hello folks, I hope you are all doing well! Here is a little update from me. After spending four months in Dublin and a great holiday in Vietnam, I have finally come back to the Netherlands. I moved back to Groningen 3 weeks ago and have now started my (hopefully) final year of studying. I am happy to be back, but also find that there are some things that I have had to get used to again. When I lived in Dublin, my room was in a busy street with loads of bars on it. I sometimes woke up in the middle of the night because people were singing 'Sweet Caroline, da da da' or 'You're my wonder wall' outside my window. It was such fun to experience living in a place where there was so much going on, and I still need to get used to how quiet Groningen is compared to Dublin (even though it is nice to sleep without earplugs in)

The holiday in Vietnam was also a great experience. I went with Neeltje, a friend from uni. It was so nice to have a travel buddy and we did and saw a lot. I finally learned how to eat with chopsticks, can now speak some basic Vietnamese and even got a bit of a tan. It felt like having a huge hangover, which is never fun. I am happy to get back to my job again though, and am enjoying my thesis and courses so far:)


Chapel – All welcome to join in worship, Sunday at 11am at the Chapel, Neil leading the service.

FAIR ISLE WEATHER FORECAST



GENERAL SITUATION Friday 23rd February 2024

A slack area of low pressure covers Shetland, but as the centre of low pressure drifts north a north-westerly airflow will develop later in the weekend. A ridge of high pressure topples east across the Northern Isles on Monday with a southerly airflow freshening ahead of fronts pushed east on Tuesday. A slack airflow follows on Wednesday, strengthening southerly on Thursday ahead of further fronts driven east by the next depression tracking east to the south of Iceland. Secondary lows, developing on its southern flank and currently expected to track east to the south of Shetland, then bring further unsettled conditions and risk of strong winds.

OUTLOOK FOR THE WEEKEND

Temperatures around 6° Celsius by day, 3° overnight with risk of grass frost.

FRIDAY 23rd: Early showers then mainly dry with sunny intervals. F3-4 WSW winds. Clear spells, light winds with chance of frost overnight. **Sea State:** Moderate or rough with a 2 to 3 metre W'ly wind swell.

SATURDAY 24th: Chance of showers but often dry and bright with F3-4 SW winds. **Sea State:** Mostly rough with a 3 to 4 metre W'ly wind swell. Slight to moderate east of Shetland SW 1 to 2 metre.

SUNDAY 25th: Showers later as light winds freshen F4 NW. **Sea State:** Moderate or rough with a 2 to 3 metre NW'ly wind swell.

FORECAST FOR NEXT WEEK Temperatures 6° Celsius by day 3° or 4° overnight.

MONDAY 26th: Early showers then dry and bright. Moderate NW winds backing SW. Rain spreading east overnight as S winds strengthen. **Sea State:** Moderate or rough with a 2 to 3 metre NW'ly wind swell.

TUESDAY 27th: Cloudy with rain clearing to showers as strong S winds veer fresh W. **Sea State:** Rough with a 3 to 4 metre SW'lv wind swell.

WEDNESDAY 28th – SUNDAY 3rd: Wednesday brighter with showers and lighter winds. Rain on Thursday with strong to gale S winds. Then further rain or showers with lighter winds Friday and Saturday. W winds strengthening on Sunday. **Sea State Wednesday:** Rough with a 3 to 4 metre W'ly wind swell but mostly moderate at 2 metre east of Shetland. **Dave Wheeler**
