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## Friday Night







#### FAIR ISLE WEATHER FORECAST



GENERAL SITUATION

Friday 21<sup>st</sup> June 2024

With pressure low south of Iceland and high across Central Europe an occasionally fresh south to south-westerly airflow covers northern Scotland. A weak warm front will cross Shetland today, a cold front on Saturday and a weak occlusion on Sunday. While current forecast models agree pressure will be building across the British Isles, they also indicate the far northwest and north of the UK may well remain under the influence of low pressure in the Iceland area and from midweek possibly a small depression developing close to northwest Scotland.

#### **OUTLOOK FOR THE WEEKEND**

Temperatures 13° or 14° during the day, 9° or 10° overnight.

**FRIDAY 21**<sup>st</sup>: Cloudy with patch rain, perhaps heavier late morning, clearing to a drier, brighter afternoon. F4-5 S winds easing F4. Cloudy overnight with chance of showers later. **Sea State:** Mostly moderate with a 1 to 2 metre SW to S wind swell.

**SATURDAY 22<sup>nd</sup>:** Some early showery rain then a mainly dry cloudy morning. The afternoon dry and brighter with sunny spells but then cloudier with chance of rain late evening. F4 WSW winds. Cloudy overnight with some rain. **Sea State:** Mostly moderate with a 1 to 2 metre SW

to S wind swell.

**SUNDAY 23<sup>rd</sup>:** Perhaps some early patchy mist and drizzle then drier and brighter with sunny spells. F4 WSW winds. Clear spells at first overnight, chance of showers later. **Sea State:** Mostly moderate with a 2 metre SW to S wind swell.

FORECAST FOR NEXT WEEK Temperatures 13° or 14° Celsius by day, 10° overnight.

**MONDAY 24<sup>th</sup>:** Cloudy with early showers dying out though staying cloudy. Fresh SW winds easing moderate. **Sea State:** Mostly moderate with a 2 metre SW to S wind swell.

**TUESDAY 25<sup>th</sup>:** A mainly dry cloudy day. Moderate SW winds backing S to SSE with chance of showers overnight. **Sea State:** Mostly slight with a 1 metre SW to W wind swell.

**WEDNESDAY 26<sup>th</sup> – SUNDAY 30<sup>th</sup>:** Wednesday starting cloudy with mist and drizzle, perhaps hill and coastal fog. Drier and brighter later. The rest of the week possibly rather cloudy with showers or longer spells of mostly light rain and moderate S to SE winds, occasionally fresh.

Sea State Wednesday: Mostly slight with a 1 metre S wind swell.

We are needing plenty of sunshine between now and end of the month. Current sunshine total is a miserable 67.5 hours. At the moment June 2024 is the dullest Fair Isle June since records began in 1976! The actual lowest so far is June 2017 with 89.8hrs.

Our average for June is 168.9hrs. As we are very unlikely to average 10 hours a day for the next ten days (required to reach "average") it's almost certain that this June will be dull!!

Additionally, rainfall total June 2024 currently stands at 43.4mm. June average for Fair Isle 1974-2000 is 46.8mm. As we are likely to see more rain before the end of the month then this month is likely to be exceed June average.

Average temperature for June 2024 is 9.6°C, just 0.1°C below the 1974-2000 average of 9.7°C. Up until the start of June Fair Isle has seen above average temperatures (May 2024 our warmest May ever!) and the current amount of "stored" ("accumulate") is presently equivalent to that which we normally reach by mid-July
