Thanks to Pat at Lower Stoneybrek for capturing these rare *mammatus* clouds over the isle on Wednesday, I thought I'd add a bit from the Met Office explaining just what these unusual clouds are...

Mammatus clouds are some of the most unusual and distinctive clouds formations with a series of bulges or pouches emerging from the base of a cloud. The shape of mammatus formations can vary widely; from the classic protruding shape, to a more elongated tube hanging from the cloud above.

Mammatus clouds are usually formed in association with large cumulonimbus clouds. Typically, turbulence within the cumulonimbus cloud will cause mammatus to form, especially on the underside of the projecting anvil as it rapidly descends to lower levels. These clouds generally form in the most unstable cumulonimbus, meaning that there is also a chance of hail, heavy rain and lightning in the vicinity, and if the air is cold enough during winter they can produce snow.



FAIR ISLE WEATHER FORECAST



Analysis Chart 0000 UTC Friday 30th August 2024



GENERAL SITUATION Friday 30th August 2024 High pressure building over the British Isles will extend to cover Shetland bringing settled weather for the weekend. As the centre of the high drifts northeast a southerly airflow will back south-easterly, freshening by Monday as a small frontal wave approaches Ireland. Becoming a slow-moving depression west of Scotland its frontal system, blocked by high pressure over Scandinavia, weakens as it makes slow progress towards Shetland in a fresh southeast airflow. Through next week, though gradually filling, the depression is expected to remain a slow-moving feature to the west of or over the UK bringing a variable cyclonic airflow across the Northern Isles.

OUTLOOK FOR THE WEEKEND Temperatures 13° or 14° during the day, around 10° overnight.

FRIDAY 30th: A few early showers then dry and sunny. F4-5 NW winds backing W F3-4. Dry overnight with clear spells, light SW winds. **Sea State:** Mostly moderate with a 2 metre W wind swell. Slight east of Shetland at SW 1 metre.

SATURDAY 31st: A dry sunny day with F3 SW winds backing F4 SSE, perhaps bringing some patchy low cloud later. Dry with clear spells overnight. F4-5 SSE winds. **Sea State:** Mostly slight with a 1 metre W wind swell.

SUNDAY 1st: Dry and bright with sunny periods by day clear spells overnight. F5 SSE winds. **Sea State:** Mostly slight with a 1 metre S wind swell.

FORECAST FOR NEXT WEEK Temperatures 13° or 14° during the day, around 9° overnight.

MONDAY 2^{nd:} A dry day with some sunny spells and fresh SE winds. Cloudier later with patchy rain in the evening and overnight. Fresh SE winds. **Sea State:** Mostly moderate with a 2 metre SE wind swell.

TUESDAY 3rd: Rather cloudy with early patchy rain then drier and brighter with mostly moderate W or WNW winds. **Sea State:** Moderate to rough with a 2 to 3 metre SE wind swell.

WEDNESDAY 4th – SUNDAY 8th: Rather cloudy though mostly dry on Wednesday and Thursday with moderate NW to N winds falling light. Freshening ESE winds bringing mist and low cloud on Friday and probably through the weekend. **Sea State Wednesday:** Mostly moderate with a 2 metre SE wind swell. **Dave Wheeler**
