
ISLE NOTICES

FAIR ISLE WEATHER FORECAST



GENERAL SITUATION Friday 20th September 2024

High pressure over the southern Norwegian Sea and southern Scandinavia continues to feed a light south-easterly airflow across Shetland. Little changes at first but as the high weakens a shallow low forming southwest of the British Isles drifts north-east over the North Sea bringing a fresher northerly airflow across Shetland for Monday. Next week, as high pressure over Iceland declines a developing Atlantic depression edges towards the British Isles. Later in the week, as the depression tracks across the south of the south of UK and into Scandinavia a northerly airflow freshens across northeast Scotland.

OUTLOOK FOR THE WEEKEND Cooler at around 12° during the day, 10° overnight.

FRIDAY 20th: While the fog may lift to hill fog for a time this afternoon fog will return this evening and overnight with chance of a little drizzle. F2-3 ESE winds. **Sea State:** Slight with a 1 metre W wind swell.

SATURDAY 21st: Fog lifting to hill fogf.Cloudy with a little drizzle possible and continuing likelihood of haar. F2-3 E winds. **Sea State:** Slight with a 1 metre N wind swell.

SUNDAY 22nd: Cloudy, mostly dry but continuing risk of haar. F2-3 ENE winds. **Sea State:** Slight with a 1 metre N wind swell, slight or moderate at 1 to 2 metre S east of Shetland.

FORECAST FOR NEXT WEEK Temperatures 11° or 12° during the day, 9° overnight. **MONDAY 23^{rd:}** Cloudy, mainly dry at first, some light rain by afternoon. Fresh N winds. **Sea State:** Slight with a 1 metre N wind swell. **TUESDAY 24th:** A brighter day with sunny spells, scattered showers and a fresh NNE breeze. **Sea State:** Mostly slight with a 1 metre N wind swell. **WEDNESDAY 25th – SUNDAY 29th:** Wednesday cloudy and mostly dry with lighter winds. Sunny spells and showers Thursday as N winds strengthen. The end of the week and weekend cloudy and drier as easing N winds back W. **Sea State Wednesday:** Moderate or rough with a 2 to 3 metre N wind swell. **Dave Wheeler**
