## More thoughts on place names of Fair Isle

I spent a lot of time at Shirva with Nanny and Daddad - Annie and Stewart Thomson, Neil's lovely parents, especially when the bairns were peerie.

On many occasions we would go *wast tae da banx* for a walk wi Nanny, including going up on Raeva, north and south. Nanny spoke about *Roond Raeva* for North Raeva, which I think is physically self-explanatory but she called Sooth Raeva, *Saata Raeva* or *Salt(water) Raeva*. The origin of the name wasn't anything Nanny had experienced herself, but reflected occasions in the past when sea water from the Hole o' Raeva was brought home for boiling tatties! It could be a story told by her mother, from her grandfather who came from Shirva and perhaps pre-dates the collapse of the arch connecting the two Raevas.

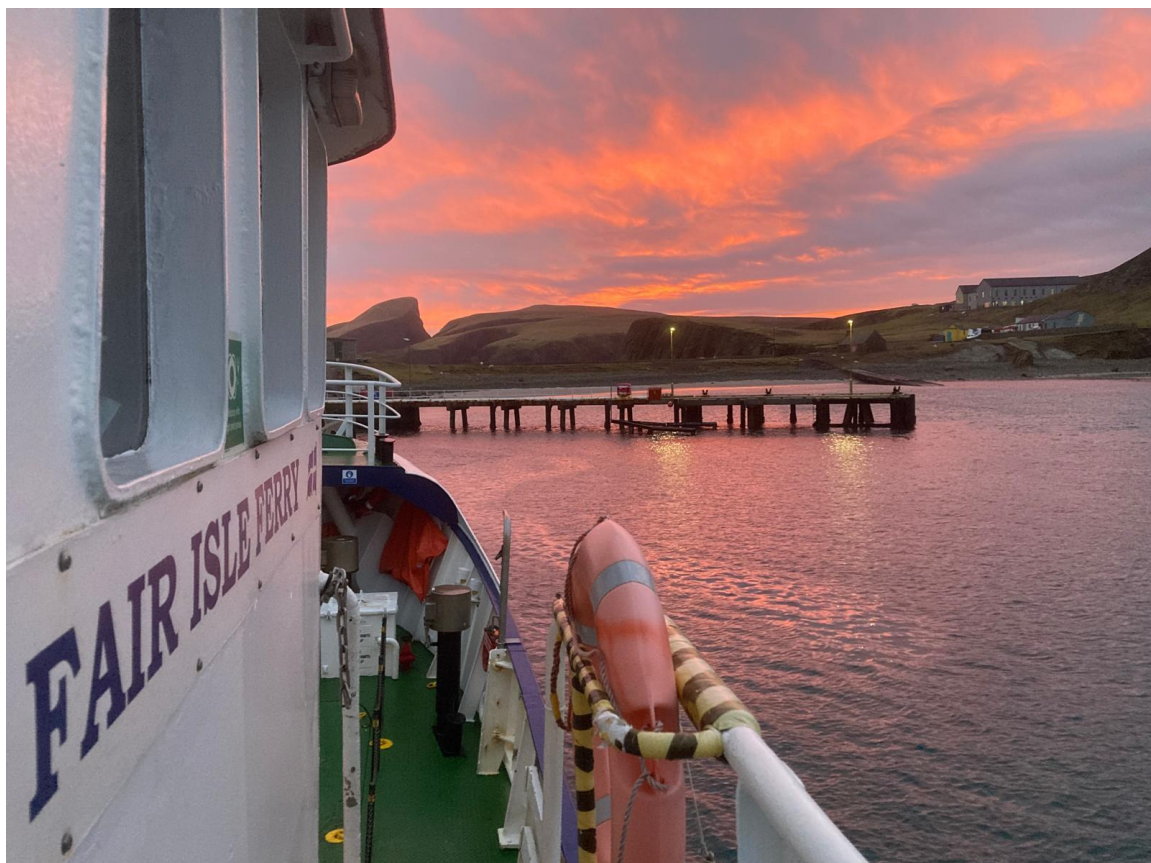

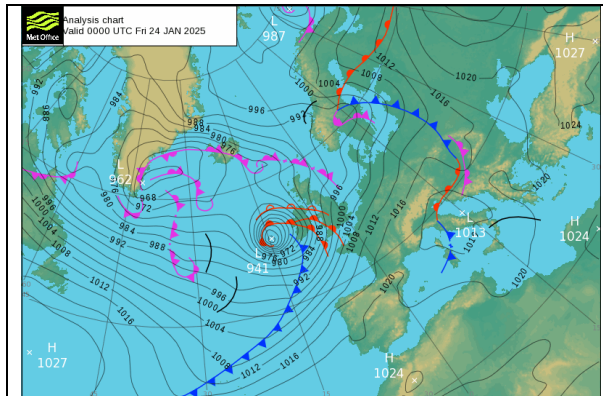

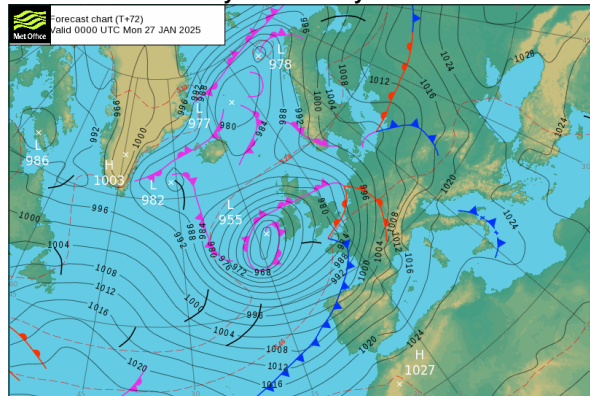

### GENERAL SITUATION Friday 24<sup>th</sup> January 2025

Storm Éowyn, close to Ireland is expected to track north just west of Shetland tonight veering the very strong east-southeast westerly severe gale force. This then easing south-westerly through the weekend as the now-filling depression continues northwards. A south-easterly airflow freshens Sunday night as another Atlantic depression approaches. Forecast to track east over central parts of the UK this puts Northern Scotland in a fresh northerly for Tuesday and Wednesday before becoming a mild fresh to strong south-westerly later in the week as yet another Atlantic depression develops.

**OUTLOOK FOR THE WEEKEND** Temperatures on today 6°, 4° or 5° tonight. Saturday and Sunday cooler at 5° or 6° and 3° or 4° overnight.

**FRIDAY 24<sup>th</sup>:** Cloudy with rain heavy at times and ESE winds increasing gale F8 to severe gale F9 with gusts to 60mph. Rain dying out as gales moderate and veer S F6 during the evening then W gale F8 to severe gale F9 with gusts 65-70mph in blustery showers overnight. **Sea State:** Very rough at 5 metre SE.

**SATURDAY 25<sup>th</sup>:** Cloudy with showers, gale F8 to severe gale F9 WSW winds moderating F7 to gale F8. **Sea State:** Very rough at 6 to 7 metre W.

**SUNDAY 26<sup>th</sup>:** Cloudy, brighter and mainly dry with F6 SW winds backing S F5. **Sea State:** Mostly rough at 3 metre SW.

**FORECAST FOR NEXT WEEK** Temperatures around 7° by day, 3° to 5° overnight. **MONDAY 27<sup>th</sup>:** Cloudy mainly dry at first then patchy rain or drizzle. A fresh E wind backing NE. **Sea State:** Rough at 3 to 4 metre SE. **TUESDAY 28<sup>th</sup>:** Cloudy with fresh E or NE winds turning N. **Sea State:** In the east moderate or rough at 2 to 3 metre SE but N west of Shetland. **WEDNESDAY 29<sup>th</sup> – SUNDAY 2<sup>nd</sup>:** Cooler, mainly dry and cloudy on Wednesday with fresh N winds becoming light variable. Thursday cloudy but mainly dry with light winds freshening S bringing overnight rain. Showers dying out Friday but probably cloudy with fresh SW winds. Strengthening SW winds with rain for the weekend and chance of gales. **Sea State Wednesday: Mostly moderate at 2 metre NW.**

This morning we had an ESE gale F8 gusting 56kn (65mph). Highest gst so far is The Cairnwell with 106mph. Lower level stations and Wales is seeing the strongest gusts Aberdaron 93mph Capel Curig 88mph. Lots of other English stations 70-80mph gusts. Our turn comes later as the storm moves north past the Northern Isles!
