

Locally, 1000 people arrived to take photographs the same evening, according to the man living in the house. Yesterday she was refloated and towed to Orkanger. Here is a photo I took of her when Jelmer, Malcolm and I went for a walk in the evening light.



She will be here for a while, as apparently, divers found a hole in her. This must be repaired before she can move on.

Report of the Archives. Part 4: The state of the buildings in Fair Isle (1803)

For our final instalment from the 1803 report on Fair Isle we turn to the state of the buildings, some of which it seems were not in the best state of repair. Certainly the church seems to have been in need of some repairs!

It's also up on the island a small House of stone apartments which was occupied by the proprietor when he occasionally went there. Also, two warehouses for storing the fish oil etc. All these are roofed with turf and are in such bad repair that they will soon become ruinous if not speedily attended to. It is thought that one warehouse is perfectly sufficient for the purposes required, and it would add much to the comfort of a tenant as well as be materially or the interest of the proprietor that this warehouse as well as the dwelling house should be furnished with slate roofs is a great deal of the surface is yearly wasted in covering them and after all the pains that can be taken there neither wind nor watertight.

The church in which a Society schoolmaster officiates every Sunday is almost an entire ruin being quite destitute of a roof, and those seats moulded and decayed by the admissions of rain.


There is no merchant and but few artifices on the island. The proprietor has always supplied the inhabitants with such articles as they required such as grains, linen, indigo, hemp, lint, wool, spades, fishing hooks, materials for boat building etc which were always settled for at accounting for the rents and however the island may be disposed of in time coming it is thought this practise ought to be continued otherwise the inhabitants will be reduced to great hardships.

The inhabitants all reside in the South end of the island their houses are likewise covered with turf from the want of straw for thatch. Formally it would seem they had been prohibited by the proprietor from digging this turf within the hill dyke That is in the south division of the island where the arable land and grass ground are situated and of late the surface of this part of the island has been cut up in the most shameful manner not only for roofing their houses but also for peats. The reporter caused intimate to them that if this practise was persisted in they would be prosecuted and from the character of the people it is hoped this intimation would have the desired effect.

We hope you have enjoyed the excerpts from over two hundred years ago, how might such a report on the state of the island read now?

FAIR ISLE WEATHER FORECAST



9° overnight.

Friday 13th June 2025 **GENERAL SITUATION**

Low pressure to the west of the British Isles will maintain a fresh south-east to south-south-easterly air flow across the Northern Isles today and Saturday. Winds will ease and veer westerly Sunday as slack low pressure drifts in across northern Scotland. As low pressure moves away northwards early next week the airflow will settle fresh south-westerly as high pressure settles over the UK midweek. . Currently it looks like this migrates eastwards with the the next Atlantic depression perhaps bringing freshening southerly winds as frontal systems attempt to push eastwards against high pressure to the east.

OUTLOOK FOR THE WEEKEND

Temperature 12° to 14° by day 10° or 11° overnight.

FRIDAY 13th: A dry sunny though hazy day with sunny spells. F5 SSE winds easing F3-4. Overnight mist, low cloud and fog. Sea State: Moderate or rough at 2 to 3 metre S.

SATURDAY 14th: A misty, foggy day with periods of showery rain, occasionally heavy with risk of thunder, F3-4 SE winds veering SW later. Sea State: Mostly slight or moderate at 1 to 2 metre SE.

SUNDAY 15th: Drier with mist, low cloud and fog clearing as brighter conditions spread northwards. F4-5 WSW winds. Sea State: Mostly slight or moderate at 1 to 2 metre SE.

FORECAST FOR NEXT WEEK Temperature 12° or 13° by day

MONDAY 16th: Some early patchy drizzle and mist then mostly dry though cloudy with moderate or fresh WSW winds. Sea State: Mostly slight at 1 metre W.

TUESDAY 17th: After a rather cloudy start becoming brighter though with chance of showers. Moderate or fresh W winds. Sea State: Mostly slight or moderate at 1 to 2 metre W.

WEDNESDAY 18th - SUNDAY 22nd: A cloudy start Wednesday then brighter with a few showers possible. Thursday and Friday dry and bright. Fresh W winds. Freshening SSE winds bringing chance of outbreaks rain for the weekend. Sea State Wednesday: Mostly moderate or rough at 2 to 3 metre W but slight inshore east of Shetland at 1 metre SW. **Dave Wheeler**
