Fair Isle 1975

Gordon and Perry Barnes of Setter left the island to take over a farm in Wales. They had started a museum in one of their sheds which I believe was taken over by someone, and stored at the North Haven.

Andrew and Kathleen Stout got married in the summer of 1975 and were to take over Setter the following year. Andrew is the younger brother of Jimmy at Skerryholm.

Pat and Neil Thomson moved into the newly modernised house at Lower Stoneybrake in August 1975. The house had been renovated for a total of £4,750! The Trust were proud to say that they had now provided 12 houses with basic amenities - hot and cold running water, flush toilet, improved kitchen and bedroom accommodation.

Electricity. Since 1962 there had been electricity supplied by three engines, each serving a different area of the isle. I believe these engines were each the responsibility of a resident in the area. The one serving the south end was under the charge of Sandy of Taft. Sandy was an early nighter and so he would switch the engine off for the night about 9pm much to the chagrin of the younger residents in that part of the isle! In 1975 a new 52Kw engine was installed in the Stackhoull quarry and connected to all the houses.

Bullock Holes and the Mast. The communications mast started in 1974 was built and stands 160 feet high.

All in all 1975 was a memorable year and with the arrival of the Wheelers, the Murrays and the Bests a couple of years previously, a golden age of prosperity and hope began which lasted for the next 35 years.

- Sunday 29th June afternoon Seabourne Venture 176 passengers


The following ship after these is the return of the Seabourne Venture on the morning of Sunday 6th July with 264 passengers expected.

FAIR ISLE WEATHER FORECAST



GENERAL SITUATION Sunday 22nd June 2025

A thundery trough edged north across the Northern Isles this morning in a moist southeasterly airflow.

As low pressure continues northwards a strong westerly follows for Monday before falling light by Tuesday.

Midweek sees an Atlantic depression tracking towards Iceland developing a fresh south-west or southerly airflow over the British Isles. This backs southeast to easterly later in the week as a small secondary low swings towards northwest Scotland before tracking across Shetland on Friday. This will probably be followed by a strong showery westerly airflow for the weekend as the low continues northwards.

OUTLOOK FOR THE WEEK Temperature 13° or 14° today 11° overnight. Next week 13° to 15° by day, 10° or 11° overnight

SUNDAY 22nd: Fog with risk of thunder at first this morning, the afternoon becoming drier and clearer with some sunny spells but still the risk of a few heavy showers. F3 SE winds turning SW F3-4. Showers or longer spells of rain overnight, WSW winds increasing F5-6. **Sea State:** Slight at 1 metre SSE.

wednesday 25th June 2025

MONDAY 23rd: A cloudy day with outbreaks of rain and strong F5-6 WSW winds increasing F6 W occasionally F7. Sea State: Mostly moderate or rough at 2 to 3 metre W but slight east of Shetland at 1 metre S.

TUESDAY 24th: Cloudy with showers. F5 WSW winds. **Sea State:** Mostly moderate or rough at 2 to 3 metre W but slight east of Shetland at 1 metre SW.

WEDNESDAY 25th: Cloudy with scattered showers. Possibly some brighter, sunny spells. Moderate or light SW winds. Sea State: Mostly slight at 1 metre W. THURSDAY 26th and Friday 27th: Rather cloudy days with occasionally heavy rain Thursday clearing to showers by Friday as fresh S winds veer strong WSW. Sea State: slight or moderate at 1 to 2 metre S. SATURDAY 28th – SUNDAY 29th: Cloudy with some rain or showers and lighter S winds. Sea State Saturday: Slight or moderate at 1 to 2 metre S.
