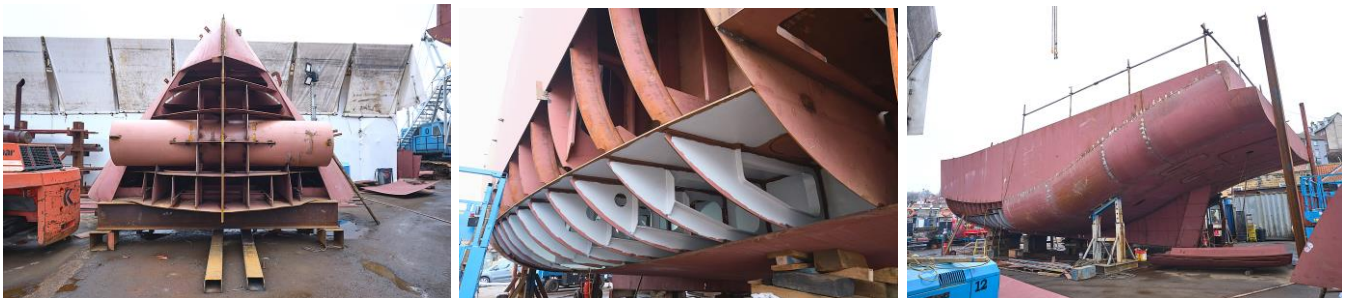
Sometimes, we have whole-school sessions.

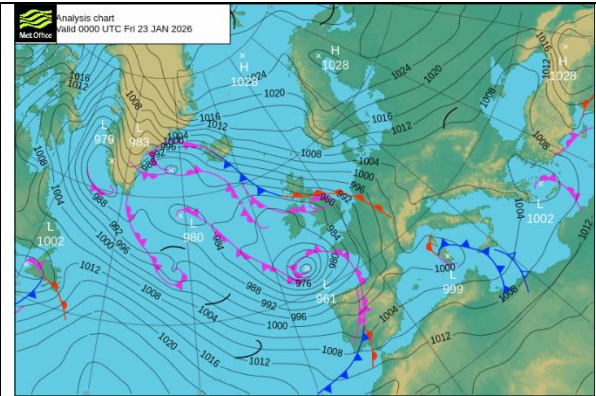

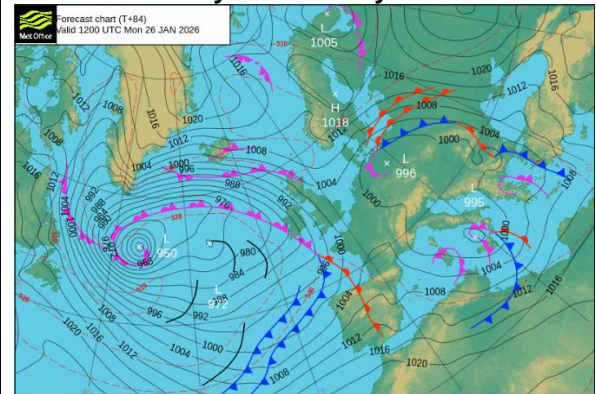

## FAIR ISLE WEATHER FORECAST

### GENERAL SITUATION

**Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> January 2026**

With a deep depression close to the southwest of the UK while pressure remains high to the north a strong to gale east-south-easterly airflow covers north-east Scotland. This eases somewhat over the weekend as the low fills and high pressure builds from the north. Then perhaps south-easterly during the first half of next week but, as high pressure declines northwards and an Atlantic depression moves east, bringing a strengthening south-easterly airflow with rain at times during the second half of the week.

### OUTLOOK FOR THE WEEKEND

Colder with temperatures around 4° by day, 2° or 3° overnight

**FRIDAY 23<sup>rd</sup>:** A colder day than of late with strong F7 occasionally gale F8 ESE winds continuing. Remaining cloudy with some showery outbreaks of rain or sleet at times. **Sea State:** Mostly very rough at SE 5 to 6 metre.

**SATURDAY 24<sup>th</sup>:** Another cloudy day with some showers, wintry at times. Strong F7 SE winds easing F5-6 ESE. **Sea State:** Mostly rough or very rough at SE 4 to 5 metre.

**SUNDAY 25<sup>th</sup>:** Perhaps mainly dry and, after a cloudy start, becoming brighter as ESE winds ease F4-5 bringing chance of a frost overnight. **Sea State:** Mostly rough at SE 3 metre.

### FORECAST FOR NEXT WEEK

Rather cold at first with temperature 4° by day, around 0° overnight bringing risk of ice. Less cold after midweek.

**MONDAY 26<sup>th</sup>:** Dry with bright spells and a fresh, occasionally strong SE breeze. **Sea State:** Mostly moderate at SE 2 metre.

**TUESDAY 27<sup>th</sup>:** Cloudy though mainly dry. Strong SE winds. **Sea State:** Rough at SE 3 to 4 metre.

**WEDNESDAY 28<sup>th</sup>– SUNDAY 1<sup>st</sup>:** Wednesday and Thursday cloudy and mainly dry with strong ESE winds. Then cloudy with SE winds increasing strong to gale-force and backing E or NE bringing rain by the weekend.

**Sea State Wednesday:** Rough or very rough at SE 4 to 5 metre.
