Literacy and English	Continuing to develop reading and writing skills through the use of main reading scheme (Storyworlds) and others (New way, Collins Pathways, etc)			
	Working on more extended pieces of creative writing, thinking about the structure and selecting interesting vocabulary. Use of success criteria to assist proof reading of own work and peer assessment.			
Maths and Numeracy	We will also be having fun using speech-to-text technology. Continuing to learn and practise number bonds and times tables facts at own levels. Applying this number fluency to be able to make calculations with bigger numbers, developing a range of mental techniques, such as subtraction using "small differences" and "round and adjust" for addition, subtraction and multiplication. Giving change by "counting on." Continuing work on telling the time.			
Health and Wellbeing	PE: The pupils will be learning about the 4 main skills in gymnastics which are balance, flight, rotation and inversion. Pupils will be discovering different ways to move efficiently and start to think about creating a short gymnastics routine.			
Play Sessions	Research provides considerable evidence that play can develop the cognitive abilities needed for formal learning: play aids development of problem solving capabilities, creativity, representational skills and memory. Another important consideration is the emotional literacy and control needed to learn in school. Playing aids the development of concentration and attention. Playing in outdoor environments with natural features has been shown to be particularly helpful to this.			
Topic	Play Scotland; Bringing More Play into the School Day; 2017 The bairns will each choose at least one craft project to make something to enter in the Yell Show. This will involve browsing and selecting activities from a range of books, and a number of practical skills to create the items as independently as possible. We will continue to tend to the plants in the polycrub and the yard, and harvest some of these for the show. While the weather allows we will be having walking excursions as often as possible, learning about local flora, fauna and their habitats.
